Discussion:

Unfortunately, James "Jim" Brown passed away on January 6, 2022. The MPO received a posthumous nomination for Jim Brown to be the recipient of the 2022 "Peggy Walters" Citizen Mobility Award. This is the 13th anniversary of the award presentation. The Award recognizes achievement by an individual or group who, through their efforts and accomplishments, has made significant and noteworthy contributions to transportation planning in Charlotte County.

Jim Brown served on the MPO's Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) for more than a decade and was very faithful in his meeting attendance. He served as CAC Chair in 2020 and delivered his CAC Chair's Report at the MPO Board Meetings during that time.

Jim Brown was a retired Comptroller for the Saturn Division of General Motors and a veteran of the U.S. Army. He and his wife, Sue, moved to Punta Gorda from Nashville, Tennessee in 1997. Jim had an expert understanding of all Charlotte County transportation issues, especially those in South County, the area that he represented on the CAC. His favorite topic was how to address needed safety improvements to the Burnt Store Road corridor. He worked tirelessly to see them finally come to fruition at the end of 2021. Moments of silence were observed in Jim's honor at: (1) the Joint Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO Board Meeting held with the Lee County MPO on February 18, 2022, at the Burnt Store Road Presbyterian Church and (2) the CAC Meeting on March 9, 2022 at the Charlotte County East Port Environmental Campus.

As a long-time Charlotte County resident, Jim Brown showed by example that one person through his efforts and vision, can greatly improve transportation mobility and community enhancements in Charlotte County, just as Peggy Walters so epitomized.

Discussion:

The Charlotte County – Punta Gorda MPO carried forward an estimated \$46,700 from FY 2021/2022 FTA Section 5305(d) as a placeholder to include in the new FY 2022/2023- FY 2023/2024 UPWP. The MPO is required to amend the FY 2022/2023 UPWP to reflect the actual figures remaining in FY 2021/2022 UPWP. Through June 30, 2022, the MPO total carry forward for FTA 5305(d) is \$48,836.06, which is more than what was included in the FY 2022/2023 UPWP. This amendment increases the estimated carryforward for FY 2022 FTA Section 5305(d) Grant by \$2,136.06.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CHARLOTTE COUNTY-PUNTA GORDA METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION BOARD ("THE MPO BOARD") APPROVING AMENDMENTS TO THE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION GRANT AGREEMENT (PTGA) FOR TRANSIT PROJECTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR FY 2021/2022, AND MOVING THE FTA SECTION 5305(D) CARRYFORWARD FUNDS TO FISCAL YEAR 2022/2023 OF THE UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP)

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Public Transportation Grant Agreement (PTGA) is the MPO's annual Federal Transit Administration (FTA) 5305(d) Grant approved by the MPO Board on December 16, 2021 and entered into on January 7, 2022; and

WHEREAS, FY 2020/2021 unexpended funds planned to be expended in FY 2022/2023 must be carried forward into the FY 2022/2023 UPWP; and

WHEREAS, the attached amendments to the PTGA for FY 2021/2022 are recommended by MPO Staff in consultation with staff of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to transfer carryforward funds that have not been spent nor encumbered, into FY 2022/2023.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization that:

- 1. That the PTGA Amendment 1 for 410114-1-14-31 is approved.

1. Call to Order & Roll Call

CAC Vice-Chair Dianne Quilty called the CAC Meeting to order at 1:30 P.M. The roll call was taken. A quorum was present.

2. Pledge of Allegiance

All attendees recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. Public Comments on Agenda Items

At this time CAC Chair Charlie Counsil was in attendance and chaired the meeting. There were no public comments received.

4. Reports

A. Chair's Report

Charles Counsil had nothing to report but extended his appreciation to D'Juan Harris for sending the District One Districtwide RoadWatch Report.

B. City of Punta Gorda Report

Beaumont Hayner informed the Committee that the City of Punta Gorda Staff followed up on the BPAC members concerns regarding the "Wheels and Wings" event in Punta Gorda and reached out to the Project Manager to inquiry the route options for this event. He also stated that the City of Punta Gorda is happy to partner with the MPO regarding the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant program and mentioned MPO Staff will be presenting an overview of the SS41 grant opportunity at the next City of Punta Gorda Council meeting on July 13, 2022.

C. Charlotte County Report

Ravi Kamarajugadda had no new projects to discuss but informed that the Olean Boulevard. widening project is complete and going through final punch list.

He indicated that Charlotte County Public Works initiated several ordinances on county roads pertaining to no parking, no through truck traffic, and speed reduction on select roads throughout the county. The ordinances were passed at the last Charlotte County Board of County Commissioners Meeting on June 28, 2022.

He requested if CAC Members had questions or concerns, please reach out to him.

D. Sheriff's Report

Ed Zubal was concerned about the absence of a staff member from the Sheriff's Office. Laks Gurram indicated that the MPO staff reached out to Sgt Dustin Paille on numerous occasions and notified their interest attending the meetings and indicated their presence at the April 13, 2022 CAC meeting. He stated that he would reiterate the need to have a Sheriff's Department staff person participate at the CAC. He further encouraged the committee members to notify MPO Staff if their have any specific concerns that law enforcement staff can address.

D'Juan Harris indicated that he met personally with Sheriff Prummel and echoed the importance of law enforcement presence at these meetings. He extended his gratitude for the law enforcement support and their participation at the MPO committee meetings. He further mentioned that Sheriff's department is short staffed. He also mentioned the Charlotte County Sheriff's department attend CTST and BPAC meetings and provide their feedback whenever possible. Pauline Klein and Bob Logan reiterated the importance of law enforcement staff presence and input periodically at both CTST and BPAC meetings.

5. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Report

Tanya Merkle reported that FDOT is waiting on the Governor to sign the adopted Work Program so it can be distributed to member entities. She also informed about the mobility week in the month of October from 21st through the 28th.

Ed Zubal inquired about the status of the signal at SR 776 @ Gulf Stream Boulevard. D'Juan Harris informed that he communicated with the FDOT Project Manager and indicated that it is a FDOT push button/design build project and scheduled to be complete by the end of summer.

6. Consent Agenda

- A. Approval of Minutes: April 13, 2022 Meeting
- B. FY 2022/2023 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Task 8 FFY 2021 FTA Section 5305(d)/Public Transportation Grant Agreement (PTGA) Amendment

Bob Logan made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. **William Klossner** seconded the motion, and it was passed unanimously.

7. North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) Feasibility Study – FINAL UPDATE

Patrick Bateman gave a PowerPoint presentation, North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) Feasibility Study from Burnt Store Road to Piper Road.

FDOT initiated the project two years ago as a roadway widening project. As the project continued to progress, FDOT took at a second look at various elements of transportation which includes mobility, safety, intersection improvements, emergency response, and evacuation improvements. In the analysis phase, FDOT Staff conducted extensive public outreach to obtain input on the types of improvements to be considered along the North Jones Loop Road and Punta Gorda Airport corridor. The purpose of this research was to determine multimodal transportation solutions to prepare for planned regional developments within the vicinity of this corridor. The outreach included meetings and presentations to elected/appointed officials. FDOT met with staff from the City of Punta Gorda, Charlotte County, and the Punta Gorda Airport. FDOT also coordinated with the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization's (MPO) Committees, Board Members, and business stakeholders.

Patrick Bateman described the three segments of the proposed improvements on Jones Loop corridor. Segment One from Burnt Store Rd to Knight Trail/Mac Drive outlined proposed changes to six-lane Jones Loop and reroute left turns at Taylor Road. Segment Two, within I-75 limited access right-of-way will include shared use paths. Segment Three includes a roundabout at Piper Road @ Jones Loop Road. This section of the roadway is part of the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS)

Pauline Klein expressed her displeasure with roundabouts and asked if the recommendations are final. D'Juan Harris informed that this project is in Feasibility Study phase and when it is in the Design Phase, FDOT staff will conduct required public workshops/meetings to obtain public input before proceeding to next phase of project production.

Diane Quilty asked three questions:

- 1. Where does the project fall in the LRTP?
- 2. Is this project a MPO priority?
- 3. What is the estimated completion of the project?

Laks Gurram responded that the Jones Loop has been an MPO Priority since the last four LRTP updates. He also indicated that once the project is in Design Phase it could take several years to get funded through construction. Given the current funding circumstances, the project is anticipated to be funded for construction by 2030.

8. Taylor Road (CR 765A) Feasibility Study - UPDATE

Patrick Bateman, FDOT gave a PowerPoint presentation, *Taylor Road Feasibility Study from Royal Road to Airport Road*.

The purpose of this project is to improve safety for bicyclists and pedestrians, which are particularly vulnerable to conflicts with vehicles on shared facilities, by providing a pathway

separated from general traffic. The project will also provide connectivity to the City of Punta Gorda's neighborhoods with the region's bicycle and pedestrian amenities, parks and recreational facilities, and conservation lands in the area.

Initially the project was from US 41 to Airport Road, however, due to the railroad crossing at the southern terminus the new project limits were shortened to Royal Road to Airport Road. The project is divided into two segments. Segment 1 is from North Jones Loop Road to Airport Road. This segment is funded for design in FY 2024. Segment 2 is from Royal Road to North Jones Loop and is not currently funded in FDOT's Five Year Work Program. The initial project started as a PD&E study, after evaluating the wetland impacts and dividing the project into two segments, FDOT staff concluded to advance the project into the design phase. The shared use path will be considered on the east side of Taylor Road.

Bob Logan inquired if any federal funds are available to fund this project. D'Juan Harris indicated that the MPO is actively seeking opportunities to leverage federal funding opportunities for projects which is covered under staff comments.

9. Veteran's Boulevard Corridor Planning Study – Draft Recommendations

Vitor Suguri, FDOT provided an informational presentation.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District One, is conducting a Corridor Planning Study for Veterans Boulevard between US 41 and Kings Highway in Charlotte County, Florida. The subject corridor is a 6.9-mile, 4-lane divided roadway. The overall objective of this study is to improve mobility, safety, reliability, and connectivity for people who drive, walk, bike, and use transit within the study corridor.

This study will document the following:

- 1) Existing conditions including corridor characteristics, travel patterns, operational analysis of all modes, and safety assessment
- 2) Future conditions including traffic forecasts, access management review (for 2045), operational analysis of all modes and safety analysis, to develop potential safety, operational, and multimodal improvements for the Veterans Boulevard corridor. The identified improvements will be prioritized for short-term (2025), mid-term (2035), and long-term (2045) conditions through close coordination with the Project Steering Committee. The proposed recommendations are subject to change and will be implemented by Charlotte County Staff contingent upon the availability of funds.

Today's presentation included the draft recommendations based on the results of the existing and future conditions analysis along Veterans Boulevard within the study limits. These proposed improvements includes (but are not limited to) signalization, mid-block crosswalks, access management, intersection lighting, basic and enhanced intersection improvements, and

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improved signage. The presentation does provide any recommendations for capacity improvements or any proposed connection at Veterans/Raintree Boulevard/Hillsborough Boulevard.

Vitor Suguri presented each slide and discussed all the proposed draft recommendations for the corridor.

Dianne Quilty inquired about the proposed improvements at Veterans Boulevard & Cochran Boulevard. She made a recommendation to provide two right turn lanes from northbound Cochran Boulevard to eastbound Veterans Boulevard.

Laks Gurram suggested to have an exclusive EB bound lane on Veterans Boulevard to SB Torrington St. Vitor Suguri indicated that the Staff will look into the proposed recommendation at this intersection.

Diane Quilty inquired about the functionality of an R-CUT (Restricted Crossing U-Turn) median modification. Vitor Suguri explained with an visual image that was shown on slide 10.

Vitor Suguri informed that FDOT Consultant added Norman St to this presentation based on the MPO Board and CAC members recommendations. He highlighted the proposed recommendations at this intersection. He also explained the proposed recommendations at Peachland Boulevard and Kings Hwy/Veterans Boulevard. He also informed that staff will work on showing a better visual representation of turning movements at these two intersections.

10. Public Comments

Dave Comier, a citizen from South Gulf Cove appreciated the information provided in the Veterans Boulevard presentation and concurred with the proposed recommendations to implement protected right-turn lanes. He indicated that these improvements could greatly reduce the number of crashes along the Veterans Boulevard corridor. He mentioned the recent crashes in Rotonda and South Gulf Cove and suggested staff implement similar improvements at the intersection of Winchester Boulevard and Marathon Boulevard in West County.

11. Staff Comments

D'Juan Harris announced that the CAC currently has two vacancies. There are two potential applicants one for west county and one for south county, respectively. The two potential applicants Mr. Richard Kirchhoff and Dr. Mary Ellen Kiss both introduced themselves to the committee. Mr. Harris indicated that the two applicants would be official members of the CAC after the MPO Board approves their applications at the July 18, 2022 Board Meeting.

Betty-Ann Sherer shared a video animation of what an MPO is, its roles and responsibilities. She encouraged the CAC members to share their comments and concerns.

D'Juan Harris presented an overview of the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant opportunity which was created as a part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. These grants

will leverage funding to reinforce the United States Department of Transportation's paradigm shift towards a Safe Transportation System Approach. The MPO is currently in the early data collection stage of this effort and is actively seeking partners, along with letters of support to submit with the grant application for potential funding of a Charlotte County Comprehensive Safety Action Plan.

Mr. Harris will present an overview of the Safe Streets and Roads for all grant opportunity at next week's City of Punta Gorda Council meeting.

12. Member Comments

Ed Zubal expressed his concerns regarding the West Port development having only one entrance and exit on to SR 776 and US 41. Charlie Counsil echoed Eb Zubal comments and expressed his support to talk further about this topic outside of the CAC meeting.

Diane Quilty indicated that discussions between Charlotte County's Building Services Department and the private developer led to the access points both on US 41 and SR 776. She asserted that this Committee does not have any recourse or influence on what happens at those meetings with the developer. She also recommended that if anyone has any concerns on land use issues to reach out to Charlotte County's Community Development Planning Staff regarding this development or any other developments within the County.

Betty Ann and D'Juan Harris informed that Charlotte County's Planning Department handles the land use aspects of any development in the county. Ed Zubal thanked the Committee and the Staff for educating him about the process.

Laks Gurram clarified to the committee members that there are two additional entrances to the West Port development. One on Biscayne Boulevard and the other entrance would connect internally and end up somewhere at Flamingo Boulevard when the middle portion of the Murdock village be developed.

He also informed the members that on SR 776 heading to North Toledo Blade Boulevard would potentially have 2 left turn lanes and indicated that Toledo Blade Boulevard from SR 776 to US 41 would be widened to six lanes sometime in the future.

13. Adjournment (Next CAC Meeting – September 28, 2022)

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:32 p.m. The next regularly scheduled CAC meeting will be held on Wednesday, September 28, 2022, both virtually and in-person at the Eastport Environmental Campus, 25550 Harbor View Road, Port Charlotte in Training Room B beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Patrick Bateman gave a PowerPoint presentation on the North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) Feasibility Study from Burnt Store Road to Piper Road.

The FDOT conducted extensive public outreach to obtain input on the types of improvements to be considered along the North Jones Loop Road and Punta Gorda

Airport corridor. The purpose of this research was to determine multimodal transportation solutions to prepare for planned regional developments within the vicinity of this corridor. The outreach included meetings and presentations to elected/appointed officials. FDOT met with staff from the City of Punta Gorda, Charlotte County and the Punta Gorda Airport. FDOT also coordinated with the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization's (MPO) Committees, Board Members, and business stakeholders. The FDOT prepared a newsletter, website, and an online comment form to seek additional input from the public. Based on all input received, the FDOT developed and evaluated the feasibility of various control options at intersections along the corridor and prepared preliminary draft alternatives that included pedestrian/bicycle accommodations to meet future transportation demand. The preliminary alternatives were discussed and shared with various local agency stakeholders for comment. The FDOT is in the process of coordinating additional meetings with elected/appointed officials and business stakeholders to discuss concerns regarding the preliminary draft alternatives. Once the coordination and revision of the alternatives is complete, a feasibility study report will be compiled to document the recommended alternatives.

How would the future FDOT Truck Parking facility be accessed from Piper Road?

A: A possible median opening for a u turn could be provided at the interchange on Piper Road. David Bogner added currently a second entrance to that area is not planned; the design is still in the concept phase.

The MPO was told there may be some advance NEPA required for the truck parking?

A: The truck parking could not be included in this study because this feasibility study was almost completed. The truck parking will likely require something more, and this will have different funding available. What needs to be done is still being evaluated. This is an SIS facility and will be designed by FDOT.

In looking at the slide labeled segment 1- looking at the quadrant intersections where will the displaced left turn go, from Taylor Road?

A: If traveling Jones Loop to Taylor Road, instead of turning left on Taylor Road, you could turn on Indian Springs Cemetery Road or Knight's Drive. Currently all intersections are signalized, but some of the angles are dangerous.

What is the difference between discretionary SIS and SIS Discretionary funding?

A: Discretionary SIS funding is limited and is used for "push button" projects. The district usually has \$5M in funding or less to allocate toward design build/push button projects.

8. Taylor Road (CR 765A) Feasibility Study – UPDATE

Patrick Bateman gave a PowerPoint presentation on the Taylor Road Feasibility Study from Royal Road to Airport Road.

The purpose of this project is to improve safety for bicyclists and pedestrians, which are particularly vulnerable to conflicts with vehicles on shared facilities, by providing a pathway separated from general traffic. Provide connectivity to the City of Punta Gorda's neighborhoods with the region's bicycle and pedestrian amenities, parks and recreational facilities, and conservation lands in the area. The need for the proposed shared use path project is based on the following criteria:

- Area Wide Network / System Linkage: Improve bicycle and pedestrian mobility
- Safety Conditions: Enhance safety along the corridor
- Social and Economic Demand: Improve bicycle and pedestrian accessibility

The Taylor Road Project is the MPO's number one project priority for the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). The project has been programmed in two segments because of the complexity of the roadway. The first segment, Taylor Road from Jones Loop Road to Airport Road is programmed for Design in FY 2023/2024 for \$656,521. The estimated construction is currently unfunded with a projected cost of \$5.1 million dollars. The second segment, Taylor Road from US 41 (South) to Jones Loop Road is currently not programmed in FDOT'S Five Year Work Program for design or Construction.

Comments

It was noted the design for phase 1 is funded in 2024. That area has been designated as a hazardous walk zone for schools, the sidewalk ends at Airport Road and Taylor Road and is within the 2 mile walk zone. Because of the existing 20' ditch on the north side, will it be placed on the opposite side?

A: It's cited for the future road widening on the west side, as there are powerlines on the east.

This phase 2 now begins at Royal Road and was originally proposed to cross the railroad, how will this now achieve the goal to connect to Punta Gorda Pathways?

A: Seminole Gulf Railway was approached; their conditions of agreement were quite onerous. So, the limits of the study ended at Royal Road. Jones Loop Road and Airport Road have existing crossings that could connect to the US 41 Multi Use Recreational Trail. Those crossings could potentially be upgraded since they are already existing crossings, that would have to be discussed with Seminole Gulf Railroad.

It was noted the crossing concern may trigger an LRTP amendment.

9. Veteran's Boulevard Corridor Planning Study – Draft Recommendations

Vitor Suguri, FDOT, and Babuji Ambikapathy, VHB, who provided an informational presentation.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District One, is conducting a Corridor Planning Study for Veterans Boulevard between US 41 and Kings Highway in Charlotte County, Florida. The subject corridor is a 6.9-mile, 4-lane divided roadway. The overall objective of this study is to improve mobility, safety, reliability, and connectivity for people who drive, walk, bike, and use transit within the study corridor.

This study will document the following:

- 1) Existing conditions including corridor characteristics, travel patterns, operational analysis of all modes, and safety assessment
- 2) Future conditions including traffic forecasts, access management review (for 2045), operational analysis of all modes and safety analysis, to develop potential safety, operational, ADA and multimodal improvements for the Veterans Boulevard corridor. The identified improvements will be prioritized for short-term (2025), mid-term (2035), and long-term (2045) conditions through close coordination with the Project Steering Committee. The proposed recommendations are subject to change and will be implemented by Charlotte County Staff contingent upon the availability of funds.

Based on the results of the existing and future conditions analysis recommendations (based on safety, operational, and multi-modal) along Veterans Boulevard within the study limits will be developed. These improvements can include (but are not limited to) signalization, mid-block crosswalks, access management, intersection lighting, basic and enhanced intersection improvements, and improved signage.

After this meeting, the priority list will be distributed, and there will be an opportunity to comment. The Final Draft will be presented at the July 18, 2022 MPO Board Meeting for final recommendations of the study.

Comments:

Are the proposed U turns like "Jughandles" as used in New Jersey?

A: Yes, similar design.

Since Restricted Crossing U- Turn Intersection (R-CUT) median modifications are new to this area, it might be useful for the road segments be presented with an overlay to better visualize how this would work in this area here?

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It was noted the FDOT's Electric Vehicle (EV) Master Plan is being deployed today.

FDOT Staff was thanked for their quick response to the Commissioners comments at the May 2022 MPO Board Meeting and for including the Norman Street intersection in this study.

10. Public Comments

There were no public comments.

11. Staff Comments

Betty-Ann Sherer presented a short, animated video created by MPO Staff which provided an overview of "What is an MPO".

Comments:

It was recommended to make the language provided more specific to Charlotte County.

Laks Gurram welcomed Slade downs and Wenonah Venter, planning partners from the Sarasota/Manatee MPO, as we have been working on having stronger connections to our regional partners.

Director Harris presented an overview of the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) grant opportunity which was created as a part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. These grants will leverage funding to reinforce the US DOT'S paradigm shift towards a Safe Transportation System Approach. The MPO is currently in the early data collection stage of this effort and is actively seeking partners, along with letters of support to submit with the grant application for potential funding of a Charlotte County Comprehensive Safety Action Plan.

Mr. Harris will present an overview of the Safe Streets and Roads for all grant opportunity at next week's City of Punta Gorda Council meeting.

1. Call to Order & Roll Call

Acting Chair Court Nederveld called the hybrid meeting to order at 2:01 p.m.; a quorum was present.

2. Pledge of Allegiance

All attendees recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. Public Comments on Agenda Items

There were no public comments received.

4. Chairs Report

Acting Chair Court Nederveld commented on the minutes from the 2/24/22 BPAC meeting. He would like the definitions regarding sidewalk, shared use paths in the minutes for today's meeting.

He also noted he would like to see the County change their sidewalk design to use saw cut joints for future projects. Ravi Kamarajugadda recommended him to send a letter to Joanne Vernon, Charlotte County Engineer.

Chair Nederveld also recommended the County adopt the Idaho Stop sign law attached to these minutes.

5. Consent Agenda

A. Approval of Minutes: February 24, 2022

A Motion was made by Robert Logan to approve the Consent Agenda. Wendy Zurstadt seconded the Motion; and the Motion was approved unanimously.

6. Sheriffs' Office Report-Public Safety

Sheriff Miller presented the report of Bicycle and Pedestrian Crashes prepared by Donna Buffington, Intelligence Analyst for the period of January 1 through May 31, 2022. He noted in the first five months of 2022, a total of 2,378 crashes were reported in Charlotte County. Almost half of these occurred along the US 41/Tamiami Trail corridor between the Charlotte/Sarasota County line and the southern side of the City of Punta Gorda. Out of 71 Bicycle/Pedestrian crashes, four resulted in fatalities, two involved a bicycle, and two involved a pedestrian. Two of the fatalities occurred along Tamiami Trail in Port Charlotte.

Chair Nederveld asked from CCSO's perspective, are there any recommendations you would make to help the County achieve Vision Zero?

Sheriff Miller stated at this time the Sheriff's Department is doing everything they can and praised the efforts of the MPO and other stakeholder groups to continue their efforts to continue educating the citizens in the Charlotte County Community.

Beaumont Hayner, City of Punta Gorda, asked if more detailed information could be provided regarding the specific intersections where these crashes have occurred to determine if there are areas where improvements can be made.

Sheriff Miller noted intersection details could be provided with future reports. Ravi Kamarajugadda added every three months he downloads crash data for the County and evaluates the locations, crash types and identifies possible improvements that can be implemented. He maintains an ongoing list. He stated the County and the Sheriff's office pull their information from the same source.

7. FDOT Bicycle/Pedestrian Coordinator Report

Tanya Merkle noted Deborah Chesna the Bicycle Pedestrian Coordinator has left FDOT. She directed any questions or concerns can be addressed to Bessie Reina, the Transportation Planning Manager.

Director Harris asked if there was an update for the SUN Trail call for projects? Ms. Merkle did not have an update. However, she indicated she would investigate and follow up with a status update.

8. North Jones Loop Feasibility Study Update

Richard (OJ) Oujevolk gave a PowerPoint presentation, North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) Feasibility Study from Burnt Store Road to Piper Road.

FDOT District One began a Feasibility Study in July 2020 to evaluate the potential widening of North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) up to six lanes from Burnt Store Road (CR 765) to Piper Road in Charlotte County, Florida. The project will include mobility, safety, intersection, emergency response, and evacuation improvements.

The project is in an area that is transitioning from a rural to urban environment. Per the City of Punta Gorda and Charlotte County Future Land Use Maps, the corridor is intended to support commercial uses and the economic district of Punta Gorda Interstate Airport Park [formerly Enterprise Charlotte Airport Park], which is located east of I-75 and immediately north of North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) and includes the Punta Gorda Airport. The Punta Gorda Interstate Airport Park is a designated Foreign Trade Zone and encompasses 4,300 acres of land available for aviation, manufacturing, and distribution companies.

The project has been divided into three segments and presented each segment, proposed improvements as well as alternatives.

Richard (OJ) Oujevolk noted he will be working with the MPO to get funding for safety improvements along these segments.

The following goals and objectives have been identified for this study:

- Increase capacity
- Improve area wide connectivity and local/regional mobility
- Support local economic development initiatives and planned area growth
- Enhance emergency evacuation response times
- Enhance access for freight and commuter traffic

Chair Nederveld noted Piper Road and Jones Loop going east is a major bicycle route and a roundabout would be perfect in this location, to assist in traffic flow.

Mr. Oujevolk noted that a roundabout is the preferred option in this area and pointed out proposed shared use paths along all the segments. He added bicycle pedestrian facilities are standard considerations during these studies.

As a side note, another project in review is the reopening of the closed rest area for truck parking. Evaluation of the location to bring the facility up to safety standards (Jacob's Law) are being reviewed.

Mr. Oujevolk also noted FDOT may need assistance from the MPO regarding communications with Gulf Coast Railroad.

Betty Staugler expressed concern with the detectable warning pads as she noted the pins used to hold them in place seem to lift and pose a hazard.

Mr. Oujevolk made note of this concern.

11. Charlotte County Report

Ravi Kamarajugadda – currently there is no county report, is available to answer any questions.

He demonstrated an interactive dashboard he developed showing the intersections and crash locations in Charlotte County. The data for this dashboard was obtained from Signal Four Analytics and can be accessed through the Charlotte County website. He also noted speed detection signs are being used throughout the county. These signs gather data that can be downloaded and coordinated with the Charlotte County Sheriff's office.

12. City of Punta Gorda Report

Beaumont Hayner indicated the improvements to the Harborwalk Phase II project are moving forward. There will be some traffic disruption along Retta Esplanade; anticipated completion is in the Fall of 2022.

Chair Nederveld noted there will be a Wheels and Wings Bicycle event on Sunday July 10th in Charlotte County where a portion of the route will be through Retta Esplanade as well as Piper Road. Court indicated that he recently observed recently quite a bit of debris along these roads and hoped they could be cleared before this event.

Wendy Zurstadt will provide event and route information. She noted that her Bicycling Group, the Peace River Riders will be adding temporary road makings for this route. Beaumont Hayner will follow up to advise if there are any conflicts with road work. Chair Nederveld added there is a pothole opening at Marion Street near Shreve Street.

PROJECT TITLE

Golf Course Blvd. / Challenger Blvd. - CIP No. 0119

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project includes the re-alignment and/or removal of Golf Course Blvd. between Mooney Ave and Challenger Blvd. to avoid encroachment in Runway protection zones and surfaces. Once the option to re-align or remove has been determined, Michael Baker will finalize a scope of work for engineering services and presented to the Charlotte County Airport Authority for approval. In addition, this project includes the extension of Challenger Blvd. from Golf Course Blvd. to Piper Road.

STATUS OF PROJECT

On March 21, 2022, AECOM presented terminal expansion alternatives to Airport staff. The alternatives included a "Linear" concept, a "New Landside Building" concept and a "Super Holdroom" concept. These alternatives were presented to Allegiant and the Airport Authority Board. AECOM continues work on the report and expects to submit the final version in July 2022.

Phase 1 - Rental Car Study - Completed

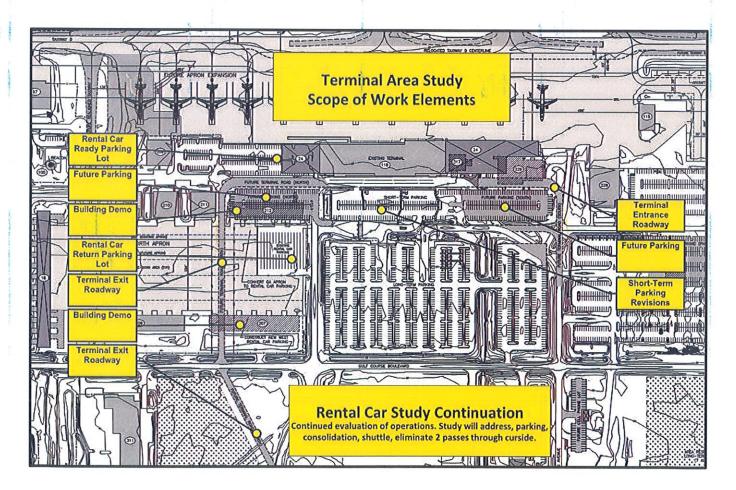

Those results were presented to the Board on September 16, 2021.

Upon completion of the Terminal Building Planning Study, a scope of work will be developed to evaluate the future phased terminal area needs. The future needs will be linked to the Terminal Building Planning Study development needs.

STATUS OF PROJECT

No Change from Previous Report - The scope of work will be developed upon completion of the Terminal Building Planning Study.

PROJECT TITLE

Terminal Seating Replacement - CIP No. 0122

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This work includes design layout, procurement, delivery, and installation of commercial use, scuff/scratch resistant, high-grade furniture and all associated materials including, but not limited to seating, under seat power ports and miscellaneous accessories for the Commercial Terminal and Rental Car facility. This work also includes removal and disposal of the old seating.

STATUS OF PROJECT

A pre-installation meeting was held on June 13, 2022, with the selected furniture vendor. Design layout options are in development and will be submitted to the Airport for review by the end of June. Once a layout has been approved, a contract will be executed, and fabrication and shipping will be scheduled. Due to supply chain and material delay issues, it appears the furniture may not arrive during the scheduled Airport closure in September 2022. Staff is evaluating alternate deliver methods.

CITY OF PUNTA GORDA REPORT TO THE MPO BOARD

JULY 2022

City Hall renovation project - Contractor presented design options to City Council in June. Council voted to select the plan that best suited the City's current and future needs, and plans will now move forward to execute the renovation plan. City Clerk's office and Finance Department have vacated the building for the duration of the construction, and are now located at office space in the ground floor of Herald Court Parking Garage (space formerly occupied by FGCU). City Council and all boards and committees will be relocated to the Gulf Theater at the Military Heritage Museum for the foreseeable future while renovations take place.

Staff continues working with County staff and FDOT to solicit input for the proposed median opening changes on U.S. 41 from Rio Villa to Payne St.

City Council on May 18 agenda regarding intersection treatments – Council voted to not install decorative treatments, as it would be an exceptionally large amount of money that no one felt was worth spending.

Gilchrist Park/Harborwalk Phase II: Construction continues for parking lot and streetside parking. Work should be complete by this fall.

Wayfinding signage - Signage is installed and project is now complete.

This problem continues – We continue to receive complaints of speeding and passing vehicles in a no passing zone from residents on Tripoli Blvd. between Madrid and Monaco which comes from FDOT closing off the median at Madrid and U.S. 41. There are numerous vehicles speeding and cutting across Tripoli to go out at the light at Monaco and U.S. 41 and not observing the 25 mph speed zone. This is further evidence that a traffic light is desperately needed on Burnt Store Rd. at the Home Depot exit driveway to divert some of the traffic and improve safety for these residents.

City Council and the Airport Authority board held a joint meeting in June to discuss general updates on projects and operations, and to have more effective communications between our two boards.

Flamingo/Edgewater Widening

Project Description:

Project will replace the existing two-lane Flamingo Boulevard from 776 to a point north of Edgewater Drive and the existing remaining section of two-lane Edgewater Drive from Midway Boulevard to Collingswood Boulevard with a new four-lane roadway. The project will also connect Flamingo Boulevard from its southernmost curve to the intersection of Edgewater Drive and Collingswood Boulevard, creating a new alignment for the roadways. Additionally, intersection improvements at 776 and Flamingo Boulevard will be included.



Current Work:

Johnson Engineering has been selected as the design firm for this project. The county will work with the firm to begin designing all project phases.

A meeting was held with FDOT to discuss the permitting requirements for the intersection of Flamingo Blvd and 776. The engineer is collecting survey data and studying traffic volumes to assist in the design and access management decisions.

1. Call to Order & Roll Call

MPO Chair Constance called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. The roll call was taken, and all board members were present.

2. Invocation – Pastor Jim Chandler

Pastor Jim Chandler delivered the invocation.

3. Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

4. Additions and/or Deletion to the Agenda

D'Juan Harris described two additions to Agenda Item #10 Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Report: (1) at the beginning, FDOT – Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSMO) Update, and (2) under Joint Local and FDOT Discussion, C. Bermont Road (CR-74) Safety Discussion – FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri - Charlotte County. The Agenda Item #10 handout and TSMO presentation was distributed to MPO Board Members and posted to the MPO website. Additionally, it was noted that the BPAC Report had already been reviewed at the previous MPO Board Meeting and would not be repeated.

Commissioner Deutsch made a motion to approve the addition of revised Agenda Item #10 and deletion of the BPAC Report. **Commissioner Herston** seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

5. Public Comments on Agenda Items

John Everson spoke on the issue of US 41/Melbourne Street (Sunseeker Resort and anticipated Whiskey Joe's area) traffic flow. Among his recommendations was a feed lane with a barrier at northbound US 41. He provided MPO staff with a <u>conceptual drawing</u> of his proposal.

Tom Ansley spoke regarding the passing dump truck noise level at the US 17/Bermont Road intersection as it adversely impacts approximately 200 Lakewood Village residents. He described a large number of dump trucks transiting the area of US 17 between Bermont Road and I-75 and astronomical noise levels (continuous 72 decibels) due to truck acceleration and deceleration even in the middle of the night. He also noted the vibration of items on the walls of his home.

Richard Russell of Port Charlotte also spoke regarding the US 41/Melbourne Street traffic issue. He suggested shifting southbound traffic trying to reach Whiskey Joe's, condemning the Chevron gas station and creating a signalized service area. He stressed the need for a long-range solution to this problem.

6. <u>PUBLIC MEETING</u>; <u>FY 2022/2023 – FY 2023/2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)</u>

D'Juan Harris reviewed the Final FY 2023 - FY 2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)/ Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement, which describes transportation planning activities and establishes the MPO budget for the fiscal years spanning from July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2024. Included in the UPWP is a description of work to be accomplished and the cost estimates to carry out each work task activity. Federal and State regulations govern the types of activities that are eligible for federal and state funding.

Following approval of the Draft UPWP/Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement at the March 21, 2022 MPO Board Meeting, the Draft FY 2023 - FY 2024 UPWP was submitted to the appropriate reviewing agencies for comments. Comments received from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) were addressed and have been incorporated in this final UPWP.

As part of the UPWP process, the MPO was required to advertise that a Public Meeting would be held to solicit public input before the MPO Board adopted the UPWP. The MPO advertised twice within the past 30 days that a Public Meeting would be held at the May 16, 2022 MPO Board Meeting. Following the Public Meeting, a roll call vote was required to adopt the UPWP.

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and the Citizens' Advisory Committee (CAC) have reviewed the document at their respective April 13, 2022 meetings and recommended that this UPWP be adopted by the MPO Board.

Commissioner Constance opened the Public Meeting. No member of the public spoke.

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to close the Public Meeting. **Mayor Matthews** seconded the Motion, and it carried unanimously.

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to adopt the Final FY 2023 – FY 2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)/Metropolitan Planning Organization Agreement and authorize the MPO Chair to sign the Authorizing Resolution and transmit the document to FDOT. The motion should allow staff to make minor changes and adjustments based on comments and input received. Mayor Matthews seconded the Motion, and it carried unanimously. A roll call vote was taken, and the Motion passed unanimously.

7. PUBLIC MEETING: Final FY 2023 – FY 2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Federal and State legislation requires MPO's to adopt a 5-year Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The TIP outlines federal and state capital improvements for transportation and is a staged, multi-year, intermodal program of transportation projects that is consistent with the MPO's Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The Draft Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO TIP for FY 2022/2023 – FY 2026/2027 is attached. The MPO Board adopted the project priorities listed in this TIP on May 17, 2021. The TIP will be submitted to FDOT for review no later than July 15TH of each year. Once approved by both FHWA and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), the TIP is then incorporated into the State TIP, (STIP) by October 1ST of each year. Approval of the STIP allows leveraging of federal funding for metropolitan areas.

The Technical and Citizens' Advisory Committees formally reviewed and recommended MPO Board adoption of the FY 2022/2023 – FY 2026/2027 TIP as presented at their April 13, 2022 meetings. Since then, MPO Staff received updated Transportation Performance Measures (TPM) fact sheets, TPM methodology and a data sources memo from FDOT which are addressed in the TIP. The TIP presented also included the updated Work Program (WP) snapshot summaries MPO Staff received on April 14, 2022.

The summary of changes to the current TIP are listed below:

- Section II 2022-2026 Summary of Additions, Rescheduling and Deletions Deleted
- Section IV Updated Performance Measures & Work Program Snapshot dated April 21, 2022 (Staff is looking for guidance from Charlotte County Transit to update Section 6 and Section 7, highlighted in Yellow)
- Section VII Updated Transit Projects WP Snapshot dated April 21, 2022
- Section VIII-Updated Aviation Projects WP Snapshot dated April 21, 2022

As part of the TIP process, the MPO was required to advertise that a Public Meeting would be held to solicit public input before the MPO Board adopts the TIP. The MPO advertised twice within the past 30 days that a Public Meeting would be held at the May 16, 2022 MPO Board Meeting. Following the Public Meeting, a roll call vote was required to adopt the TIP.

Commissioner Constance opened the Public Meeting.

No member of the public spoke.

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to close the Public Meeting. **Commissioner Deutsch** seconded the Motion, and it carried unanimously.

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to adopt the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for FY 2022/2023 – FY 2026/2027 and authorize the MPO Chair to sign the Authorizing Resolution and transmit the document to FDOT. The motion should allow the staff to make minor changes and adjustments based on comments and input received. Mayor Matthews seconded the Motion, and it carried unanimously. A roll call vote was taken, and the Motion passed unanimously.

8. Chairs' Reports

A. MPO Board Chair's Report

Chair Constance thanked John Everson for his interesting ideas, including the use of a barrier wall. He noted that FDOT had indicated that there may not be enough Right-Of-Way (ROW) at that location. He also observed that a traffic light eventually would be located a short distance to the north of the location at the Sunseeker Resort. He stated that a very long turn lane at that light may be the solution. He noted that other issues raised under Agenda Item #5 Public Comments would be addressed later in the meeting.

B. Citizen Advisory Committee (CAC) Chair's Report

CAC Chair Charlie Counsil reviewed topics discussed at the April 13, 2022, CAC Meeting where a quorum had been present. He announced two CAC vacancies, one in South County and one in West County.

CAC Members had discussed under their County Report, the FDOT proposal to eliminate the left turn option at Rio Villa Drive and the US 41 median. It was noted that an alternate route along Baynard Drive is deteriorating, cracking and collapsing. There was also concern about the troublesome area where Baynard Drive and Aqui Esta Drive intersect. In this area, efforts to navigate are complex, and the layout is strange. This area is a major ingress and egress for Punta Gorda Isles. CAC Members expressed concern where FDOT's action (Rio Villa Drive left turn median closure) could create a problem on a local street.

CAC Members had also received an FDOT report from Tanya Merkle regarding the proposed new I-75 interchange, which recently had received media attention and combined review by local governments. Additionally, the CAC Members had unanimously endorsed the MPO's draft UPWP and TIP. Also discussed was the update to the US Bicycle Route 15. Charlie Counsil commented on the altered route approved by the City of Punta Gorda, noting that it made sense, and CAC Members were looking forward to it moving ahead,

CAC Members were impressed with the draft of the Veterans Blvd Study and the amount of study done by FDOT in its analysis. A salient point was the lack of turning ability on Veterans Blvd at Loveland Blvd. The CAC was assured that the concern would be addressed.

Chair Constance questioned if the traffic flow for the Punta Gorda area of US 41 and Rio Villa Drive had ever been on an MPO Board agenda in the past. Mayor Matthews did not believe that it had, except as reviewed as part of FDOT's US 41 Vision Study. Mayor Matthews stated that an unintended consequence in this area was also numerous accidents at Aqui Esta Drive and US 41 where vehicles in the northbound US 41 left turn lane were often stuck extending into the US 41 left "through traffic" lane. She noted that it was a massive, horrible mess that would only get worse as development progressed. She reiterated that this was one of only two ingress/egress routes for Punta Gorda Isles. She requested that FDOT associates listen to these concerns. Commissioner Constance requested that the topic be added to the agenda moving forward. He stressed that nothing should happen at the intersection until the left turn extension on Aqui Esta Drive was addressed, since currently full repercussions were unknown. Mayor Matthews noted that this was a big issue of citizen concern.

Secretary Nandam clarified FDOT's position regarding traffic in this area. He noted that in response to Mayor Matthews' concerns regarding the insufficient northbound US 41 left turn lane at Aqui Esta Drive, FDOT would address the problem of lane storage as part of a resurfacing project that included the intersection improvement. Construction would commence soon. Secondly, he noted that the median opening at Rio Villa Drive would not be completely closed, but rather restricted to "left turns only" out of Rio Villa Drive onto US 41 southbound. FDOT staff had done a comprehensive evaluation looking at both intersections together. Commissioner Constance questioned the timing of the traffic data collection to see if it reflected high season demand. Secretary Nandam stated that it was likely tied to high season and conducted pre-pandemic. Commissioner Constance appreciated this but felt that the data might be stale at this time.

C. Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Chair's Report

TAC Chair Mitchell Austin described the April 13, 2022 TAC meeting as reflected in the agenda items, including UPWP/TIP/Project Priorities/US BR 15.

D. Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) Chair's Report

MPO Board Members pulled this item under Agenda Item #4, since they already had received a briefing from BPAC Chair Pauline Klein on the February 24, 2022, BPAC Meeting at the March 21, 2022 MPO Board Meeting.

9. Local Government Reports

A. Charlotte County Airport Authority

Commissioner Herston, Charlotte County Airport Authority Vice Chair, provided MPO Board Members with a detailed packet of information on Airport activities. He reviewed key items, including details of a recent Honor Flight, discussion on County impact fees, hangars, and other upcoming projects. Commissioner Tiseo inquired about the self-serve fuel facility lease. Commissioner Herston stated that it currently was being constructed under the general aviation side of the Punta Gorda Airport which he believed would own it. Mayor Matthews described the

excitement of attending the return of the local Honor Flight (73 veterans and their guardians) on Saturday, May 14, 2022. This was the first Honor Flight departing and returning out of the Punta Gorda Airport. The reception included several hundred enthusiastic attendees. She characterized it as awe-inspiring and noted that event video was posted on her Facebook page.

B. City of Punta Gorda

Mayor Matthews had provided the City of Punta Gorda report for the MPO Board agenda packet. Projects listed in the report were: the Historic City Hall renovation, proposed median opening changes on US 41 from Rio Villa to Payne Street, Northbound US 41 Vision Study, intersection treatments as they relate to the US 17 repaving project, Gilchrist Park/Harborwalk Phase II project, wayfinding signage in the downtown area, speeding and passing vehicles in a no passing zone on Tripoli Blvd. between Madrid and Monaco due to FDOT closure of the median at Madrid and US 41 (ties to the need for a traffic light on Burnt Store Road at the Home Depot exit driveway to divert traffic and improve safety), a proposed joint meeting between the City Council and the Charlotte County Airport Authority, and a new sidewalk maintenance risk assessment and repair program to identify City liability concerns.

She provided an update to her report by stating that wayfinding signage was now almost complete.

C. Charlotte County

Commissioner Tiseo gave the County report on the following items including timelines:

- Burnt Store Road Phase 2 (Notre Dame to North of Zemel Road)
- Olean Blvd Widening (from US 41 to Easy Street)
- Various Intersection Improvements

Commissioner Tiseo mentioned two tragic fatalities that occurred recently on Burnt Store Road in the earthen collapse at a job site. He described this as very unfortunate and offered prayers for the families of the two deceased young men.

Commissioner Tiseo was happy to report that the Olean Blvd. project was close to completion. He also noted that the FDOT corridor traffic study now includes Veterans Blvd. He reported that the study was still on track and would impact next steps on Veterans Blvd. Commissioner Constance noted that there was no language regarding four lanes in the area of the Flamingo Blvd. connection at Collingswood Blvd. Commissioner Tiseo responded that the BCC has made it clear. John Elias corroborated that the project was in the County's schedule.

10. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Report

1. FDOT – Transportation Systems Management and Operations Update

Mark Mathes and Steven Davis gave a Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSMO) presentation. It was also posted on the MPO's website: <u>STMC Operations Review</u> (ccmpo.com)

Steven Davis noted that FDOT's Arterial Operations staff was working closely with County Staff on many projects.

Commissioner Deutsch mentioned problem intersections at both US 41/Forrest Nelson Blvd, and SR 776/Flamingo Blvd.

Commissioner Herston asked Steven Davis about signal timing for posted speed limits and how these signals are switched to an actuated side street system during various times of day.

Discussion followed regarding the history and safety concerns on right turn lanes at the intersection of Harbor View Road and US 41 northbound (lack of ability to turn right on red and resultant traffic stacking). FDOT Staff pledged to work on alternates to Harbor View Road and find a solution to the stacking of cars on Harbor View Road. Some of the suggestions received from Commissioners were to allow at least one right lane turn on red. FDOT Staff indicated that they will take a look at this intersections with proposed recommendations. A similar right turn lane situation exists at US 41 and Olean Blvd, but the sight lines are better, since they are not as skewed. FDOT staff pledged to report on Olean Blvd. and US 41 signal flow and traffic data collection at the next MPO Board Meeting in coordination with County staff.

Commissioner Deutsch asked FDOT staff about issues with signals running through complete cycles that prevented timely turning ability for drivers awaiting intersection access. Mark Mathes stated that this adjustment could be accomplished with delay on left plus right turn detector techniques.

Discussion followed regarding signal timing along the SR 776 Corridor. Some adjustments on side streets would be revisited with County staff since signals were not in free mode but rather a coordinated pattern. The signal installation at Gulfstream Blvd. project would be ready before school began in the Fall.

It was reported that FDOT District One was in the process of connecting to local Transportation Management Centers (TMCs) and their signal and video connections. This connection was not fully functional yet. It was envisioned as a timely staff force multiplier that would progress to an active arterial management and then, corridors. Currently, a dashboard was displayed at the bottom left of screens for major incidents along the freeway. An example was given of a major incident closing I-75 where a need developed to make a route timing change within two minutes to adapt to traffic flow. FDOT now oversees all of Sarasota and Manatee Counties with arterial management. Given its proven success, Secretary Nandam recommended that his staff work with County staff to determine what the Charlotte County community desired.

Also discussed were an interstate incidents report, the Road Ranger program, Rapid Incident Scene Clearance (RISC) large wreckers, Traffic Incident Management (TIM) Teams Wrong Way Driving Updates with LED sign activation, Traffic Vision artificial intelligence camera, and the Road Ranger Truck Mounted Camera (a District One pilot program).

MPO Board Meeting Minutes May 16, 2022

Commissioner Herston inquired whether cameras could do traffic counts when an intersection is impacted with interstate closure. Mark Mathes responded that currently this was not possible with the present cameras.

It was also noted that District One has connected vehicle plans currently underway.

Following the TSMO presentation, Secretary Nandam reported that Governor DeSantis had appointed former FDOT District Five Secretary Jared Perdue as the Secretary of the Florida Department of Transportation and Bill Watts as the new Assistant FDOT Secretary.

Secretary Nandam reported that under new Federal allocations, Florida would receive a 35% increase in formula allocations. He forewarned MPO Board Members that projects would be impacted by inflation, supply chain issues and labor shortages. Therefore, cost estimates would be increasing, and the next five-year program would be impacted. Perhaps the increases in revenue would help stabilize the program. Infrastructure Bill discretionary funding could be sought on projects like Harbor View Road improvements with more opportunities to go after those kinds of programs.

Victoria Peters, alternate for Tanya Merkle who could not be present, reported on an upcoming District One Safe Speed Workshop on June 14, 2022 from 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. at the FDOT Fort Myers Southwest Area Office (SWAO) Building on Daniels Parkway behind the rest area. It would be repeated on September 13, 2022 at the Manatee Operations Center.

Victoria Peters described the 5-Year Work Program Cycle, noting that this summer, there would be the new fifth year FY 2028 developed with new projects recently received from the MPOs.

Update and discussion with FDOT on local issues

FDOT Led Discussion

A. US 41 at Olean Blvd (Tanya Merkle/Wayne Gaither-FDOT/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

Victoria Peters stated that FDOT Traffic Operations was working on this project and had just given their update earlier in the meeting

B. SR 776 at Flamingo Blvd (Tanya Merkle/Wayne Gaither -FDOT/ Robert Fakhri - Charlotte County)

Victoria Peters noted that this item was also part of the earlier Traffic Operations briefing. It would be brought back at a later date in light of ongoing discussions with County staff.

C. SR 776 at the Charlotte Sports Park (Tanya Merkle/Wayne Gaither -FDOT/Robert Fakhri - Charlotte County)

Victoria Peters stated that this project had been removed from the Work Program due to lack of funding. FDOT would look for opportunities to reinsert it into the Work Program.

D. I-75 Possible New Interchange North of Kings Hwy. Interchange - (Tanya Merkle/Wayne Gaither-FDOT)

Victoria Peters stated that a meeting was held on April 6, 2022 to facilitate stakeholder governmental staff coordination on this initiative. The stakeholders were requested by FDOT to coordinate and develop one or more alternatives. Then a feasibility study would be done by FDOT.

Commissioner Tiseo asked FDOT staff about the possible timeline for Work Program restoration of the SR 776 at the Charlotte Sports Park project, given extensive feedback received on this issue. Wayne Gaither stated that the project was pulled to balance the budget and FDOT would make every effort to move deferrals back into the Work Program in a timely manner. Secretary Nandam stated that the design phase priced at \$187,000 should be restored. He noted that other SR 776 intersections identified will need prioritizing by the MPO Board. It was uncertain where the Sports Park project would fall on the MPO's prioritized list.

Commissioner Constance commented on the I-75 Interchange, stressing the need to analyze how it will cross over to Kings Hwy. He speculated that Commercial Way could be used, or a connection could be accomplished along Water Authority land. D'Juan Harris stated that a coordination meeting would be held on June 9, 2022, with staff from the stakeholder governments. Commissioner Constance noted that all areas under discussion are located in DeSoto County, so there was a need to reach out to the Heartland TPO. John Elias remarked that high-level conceptual discussions had already included DeSoto County. Commissioner Tiseo stated that a joint meeting between the Charlotte County BCC and the City of North Port would be held and requested that DeSoto County be included in that conversation.

Joint Local and FDOT Discussion

A. Harbor View Road Combined Funding Strategies - (Wayne Gaither-FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

Victoria Peters commented that FDOT will look at all possible funding opportunities. FDOT will continue to meet with local staff. Commissioner Constance described a new improvement regarding infrastructure. He stated that a main from Charlotte Harbor Utilities plus a sewer line would be addressed on the front end of the roadway improvement effort.

B. US 41 SB @ Melbourne Street (Wayne Gaither-FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

Victoria Peters noted that there had been much feedback and discussion regarding this issue. Staffs would need to coordinate. John Elias stated that the County staff had met with the contractor to eliminate landscaping, including the removal of native and non-native material. Commissioner Constance agreed with the assessment that a geometry issue exists with drivers

flying while exiting the northbound US 41 Peace River Bridge. Commissioner Tiseo commented on the proposal to close Melbourne Street that was floated. He remarked that unintended

consequences of closing it may evolve. At the last MPO Board Meeting, Secretary Nandam had mentioned the possible closure of the southbound US 41 left turn lane at Melbourne Street, while allowing the use of alternate ways to access the commercial and residential area. He stated that Charlotte County will need to take the lead on the roadway. Commissioner Tiseo clarified that FDOT had not ordered the closure of the roadway. Secretary Nandam agreed that it was only a possibility, but the concept must be vetted. He confirmed that a signal cannot be put at the foot of the US 41 bridge. Commissioner Constance observed that signage could be used on US 41 to direct traffic appropriately. Mayor Matthews confirmed that it was not the City's position to add traffic in the downtown area due to south bound US 41 drivers' inability to make a left turn prior to bridge crossing. Commissioner Constance stated that the traffic light at the Sunseeker Resort should funnel traffic safely to Kings Hwy.

C. Bermont Road (CR 74) Safety Discussion (FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

All three MPO Board Members who represent Charlotte County and John Elias commented on the need for safety improvements on Bermont Road (CR 74). County Commissioners had directed Charlotte County staff to do a specific workshop on Bermont Road in the near future.

Commissioner Deutsch discussed the long term need for additional bridge crossings at both the Myakka and Peace Rivers. Secretary Nandam observed that the path forward is to get these future crossings into the Comprehensive Plan and the Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). He noted that a Bermont Road resurfacing project will evaluate all US 17 intersections from I-75 to Bermont Road.

Commissioner Constance asked John Elias about how a mistake could be avoided on a Charlotte County land purchase in the proposed interchange areas at both Yorkshire Street and Raintree Boulevard. John Elias stated that Charlotte County staff is working with Administration to set aside a significant portion of the Bachmann tract where it aligns with Veterans Boulevard. Secretary Nandam recommended coordination between the FDOT team and County staff.

Regarding Bermont Road, Commissioner Constance inquired how it might be placed on the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) list (as had been successfully done with Piper Road). Secretary Nandam stated that Bermont's traffic numbers did not qualify in the past. He indicated that he would ask the question again.

11. Consent Agenda:

- A. Approval of Minutes: March 21, 2022 Meeting
- B. MPO Board Resolution Authorizing FY 2021/2022 Transportation Disadvantaged (TD) Planning Grant Agreement

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to approve the Consent Agenda. **Mayor Matthews** seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

12. 2022 Draft - Final Project Priorities

Laks Gurram reviewed new material that was incorporated into the document since the last MPO Board Meeting.

The MPO Board is required to annually develop a List of Project Priorities (LOPP) as part of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) process and to submit the list to FDOT. The MPO receives project candidates from the City of Punta Gorda and Charlotte County which include Highway, Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP), Congestion Management/Transportation System Management (CM/TSM) projects, and Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) projects. Attachment 1 is the proposed 2022 Project Priorities list.

At the April 13, 2022, TAC/CAC Meeting the Charlotte County Staff made minor revisions and additions to the list. Below are the proposed changes:

- 1. Under Highways #4, SR 776 the project limits are from Midway Blvd. to SR 776
- 2. Under TSM/CM # 3, SR 776 @ Flamingo Blvd., Charlotte County Staff is requesting funds for CST
- 3. Under TSM/CM # 4, Add signal @ SR 776 & Biscayne Blvd

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to adopt the 2022 Project Priorities including the Joint TRIP Project Priorities with Charlotte and Sarasota/Manatee MPO, and Lee County MPO for the upcoming FDOT Draft Tentative Work Program Cycle. **Mayor Matthews** seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

13. <u>U.S. Bicycle Route 15 Alignment – Discussion</u>

D'Juan Harris introduced Patricia (Patty) Huff from Adventure Cycling Association, a non-profit member organization focused on travel by bicycle, provided history and background of the US Bicycle Route (USBR) System. Ms. Huff presented draft proposed alignments of USBR 15 in Charlotte, Lee and Collier Counties for public input. The existing segment of USBR 15 is 14 miles long from the Georgia State Line to Madison, Florida (Madison County). There is a proposal to extend the USBR 15 Route from Madison to Miami for an additional 496 miles with the route traversing Charlotte, Lee and Collier Counties. The proposed route map and road-by-road direction in Charlotte, Lee and Collier Counties was shown in the presentation.

On January 26, 2022, the City of Punta Gorda approved a Letter of Support for the USBR 15 Route through the city. Approval of this proposal was then forwarded to the MPO Board for their approval. Next, it will move forward to the Charlotte Board of County Commissioners for their approval. BCC approval is needed for FDOT to request the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) designation of USBR 15.

At the April 13, 2022, TAC/CAC meeting, Charlotte County Staff suggested this presentation be made before the Charlotte Board of County Commissioners for their approval. Charlotte County Staff suggested the inclusion of a map to identify the jurisdictional boundaries of USBR 15 in

Charlotte County. The presentation included the recommendations from the TAC/CAC Members and the City of Punta Gorda.

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to approve the proposed route alignment of the USBR 15 Route in Charlotte County. **Commissioner Herston** seconded the motion, and the motion carried unanimously.

14. Veterans Corridor Planning Study - Existing Conditions Presentation

Wayne Gaither introduced Babuji Ambikapathy of VHB Consultants who provided an informational presentation on the existing conditions of the Veterans Corridor Planning Study.

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District One, is conducting a Corridor Planning Study for Veterans Boulevard between US 41 and Kings Highway in Charlotte County, Florida. The subject corridor is a 6.9-mile 4-lane divided roadway. The overall objective of this study is to improve mobility, safety, reliability, and connectivity for people who drive, walk, bike, and use transit within the study corridor.

This study will document the following:

- 1) Existing conditions including corridor characteristics, travel patterns, operational analysis of all modes, and safety assessment
- 2) Future conditions including traffic forecasts, access management review (for 2045), operational analysis of all modes and safety analysis, to develop potential safety, operational, and multimodal improvements for the Veterans Boulevard corridor. The identified improvements will be prioritized for short-term (2025), mid-term (2035), and long-term (2045) conditions through close coordination with the Project Steering Committee. The proposed recommendations are subject to change and will be implemented by Charlotte County Staff based on the availability of funds.

Based on the results of the Existing and Future conditions analysis recommendations (based on safety, operational, and multi-modal) along Veterans Boulevard within the study limits will be developed. These improvements can include (but are not limited to) signalization, mid-block crosswalks, access management, intersection lighting, basic and enhanced intersection improvements, and improved signage.

The Final Draft will be presented at the July 6, 2022, TAC/ CAC meeting and the July 18, 2022, MPO Board meeting for final review and approval of the recommendations derived the study

Commissioner Tiseo noted that Norman Street was not listed in the study. Although FDOT had not identified it as a key location, he believed that Norman Street should be added, since it was

adversely impacted (unlike the Torrington Street and Orlando Blvd. residential areas where there was access). He had concerns that the MPO Board had not been consulted. Norman Street has a full median cut, while Loveland Blvd. does not have a full cut. Commissioner Constance concurred that including Norman Street made the most sense. He requested that FDOT Staff include Norman Street in the July 18, 2022, MPO Board presentation.

15. Public Comments

Richard Russell wondered about what FDOT's maximum distance for traffic lights is. He felt there was enough distance between his proposed one at Melbourne Street and the future Sunseeker Resort entrance intersection. He also believed that barricades used in the Florida Keys should be studied for Bermont Road. He noted that US41 could benefit from roadway solutions as used in the Clearwater, Florida area. Blinking yellow lights could be utilized so that motorists could proceed and not waste gas. He also stated that Flamingo Blvd. at SR 776 could benefit from a flyover. He also questioned why a member of the Charlotte County School Board was not present on the MPO Board.

Tom Ansley, Lakewood Village resident, expressed his concern regarding Bermont Road, noting that four laning it doesn't solve his neighborhood's problem. Their issue is on US 17 and includes truck noise.

Monica Richardson also addressed the major traffic noise problem on Bermont Road. She stated that four laning Bermont Rd would make their issue worse. She described four stop lights present in a very short distance, with trucks reviving up. She pointed out that much of the semitruck traffic was a result of avoiding the interstate weigh station. She noted that a sound wall in front of residential area might be of benefit. She also believed that allowing the US Bicycle Route on that stretch of US 17 would result in fatalities.

Ruth Brooks, Lakewood Village resident, stated that the newspaper article spurred her interest in the Bermont Road situation. She described a recent 20-foot container that a truck dumped in front of their community which may have contained olive oil. Trenches remain on US 17 to absorb this oil, which she said was an eye sore and a safety concern. She counted twelve dump trucks and three semitrucks waiting at the intersection that morning. Besides controlling these dangerous driving conditions, she stressed that additional patrolling was needed. She suggested that cameras be placed at Bermont Road and US 17, since dump trucks frequently sped through red lights, so the situation needed monitoring.

16. Staff Comments

D'Juan Harris briefed MPO Board Members on recent activities including:

- Virtual Meeting on March 29, 2022 with communities along Burnt Store Road discussing future development
- Charlotte County Economic Development discussion with Dave Gammon
- I-75 and Yorkshire/Raintree Interchange Coordination on April 6, 2022/next meeting June 9 at North Port City Hall

MPO Board Meeting Minutes May 16, 2022

- Introduction Meeting on April 22, 2022 with Charlotte County Sheriff Bill Prummell
- MPO Staff participation in the Port Charlotte High School Bicycle Safety Event on April 28, 2022 done in response to a student fatality
- Meeting held on May 2, 2022 with former FDOT District One Secretary Billy Hattaway, who is now working for Fehr & Peers
- FDOT District One Vision Zero Workshop at Sarasota-Manatee Operations Center
- Open period for nominations for the Peggy Walters Citizens Mobility Award

D'Juan Harris thanked the MPO Staff for dealing with numerous last-minute additions to the meeting agenda packets. He indicted his appreciation for all of their hard work.

17. Member Comments

Commissioner Deutsch stated that there had been a great deal of good information received at the meeting, and he urged all present to drive safely.

Commissioner Tiseo reiterated important items discussed at the meeting: (1) needed involvement of DeSoto County on the interstate exchange issue, (2) requested input from Secretary Nandam on future programming on Bermont Road and (3) the addition of Norman Street. at Veterans Blvd. to the Veterans Blvd. Corridor Planning Study.

Responding to those citizens present who had US 17/Bermont Road intersection noise complaints, Commissioner Tiseo noted that perhaps noise wall installation only could be accomplished at the time of roadway planning. Secretary Nandam confirmed that noise walls are looked at only when roadways are being planned. Commissioner Constance inquired about a situation where a roadway now has greatly increased recent traffic demands and wondered if there would be an opportunity to study it. Secretary Nandam stated that there was no such opportunity to his knowledge, but he offered to check into the issue. Commissioner Tiseo inquired if the four laning of Bermont Road would allow for noise wall study. Because the community fronts the US 17 intersection improvement area, he reasoned that perhaps that could be the opportunity to reassess the noise levels. Commissioner Tiseo noted that the neighborhood is located at a major commerce point. The roadway was never sold as a residential road, but rather zoned in Charlotte County as an agricultural and mining area. As Florida gets busier, more traffic would be converging at this location. Commissioner Tiseo told citizens that they came to the day's meeting and were heard. He noted that FDOT District One Secretary Nandam would investigate opportunities to further address the issue.

18. Adjournment

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned 5:28 p.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting of the MPO Board will be held on Monday, July 18, 2022, at 2:00 p.m. at the Charlotte County Administration Center, 18500 Murdock Circle, Building B, Room #119, Port Charlotte, Florida.

Discussion:

During the development of the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization's (MPOs) 2040 and 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). Citizens identified North Jones Loop Road (CR 768) as one of the top roads to invest in within Charlotte County, given the growth occurring and expected to continue within this portion of the county.

The following goals and objectives have been identified for this study:

- Increase capacity
- Improve area wide connectivity and local/regional mobility
- Support local economic development initiatives for planned area growth
- Enhance emergency evacuation response times
- Enhance access for freight and commuter traffic

STUDY UPDATE:

The FDOT conducted extensive public outreach to obtain input on the types of improvements to be considered along the North Jones Loop Road and Punta Gorda Airport corridor. The purpose of this research was to determine multimodal transportation solutions to prepare for planned regional developments within the vicinity of this corridor. The outreach included meetings and presentations to elected/appointed officials.

FDOT met with staff from the City of Punta Gorda, Charlotte County and the Punta Gorda Airport. FDOT also coordinated with the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization's (MPO) Committees, Board Members, and business stakeholders. The FDOT prepared a newsletter, website, and an online comment form to seek additional input from the public. Based on all input received, the FDOT developed and evaluated the feasibility of various control options at intersections along the corridor and prepared preliminary draft alternatives that included pedestrian/bicycle accommodations to meet future transportation demand.

The preliminary alternatives were discussed and shared with various local agency stakeholders for comment. The FDOT is in the process of coordinating additional meetings with elected/appointed officials and business stakeholders to discuss concerns regarding the preliminary draft alternatives. Once coordination and revision of the alternatives is complete, a feasibility study report will be compiled to document the recommended alternatives.

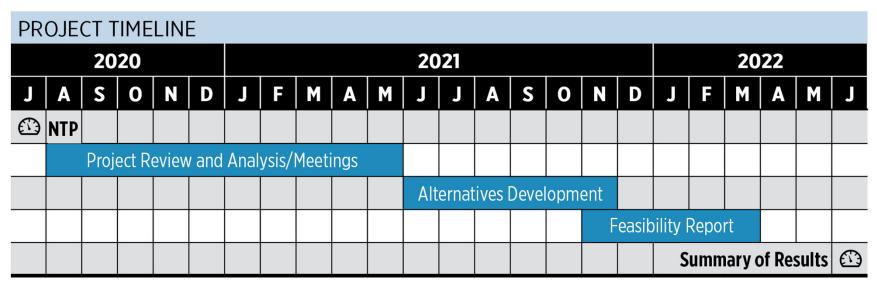

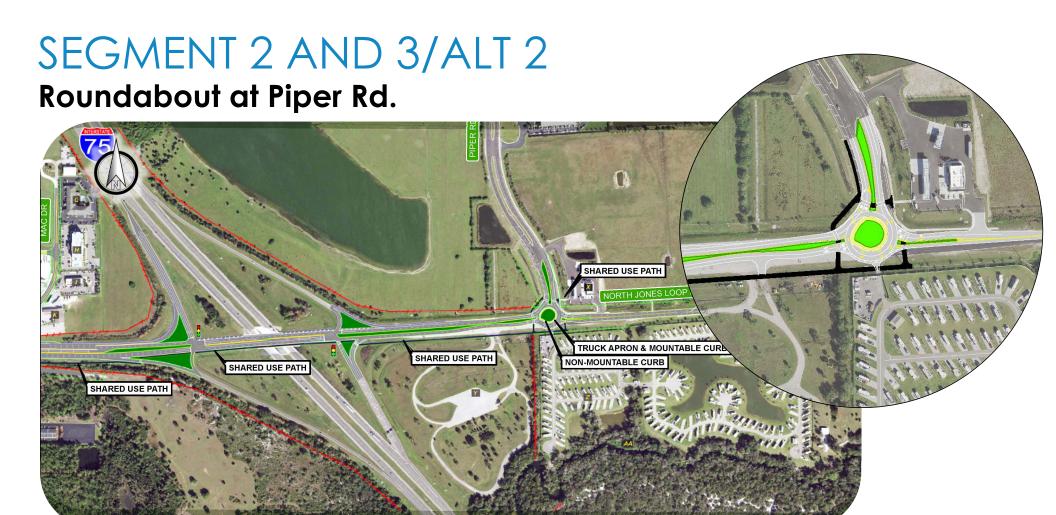

The purpose of this project is to improve safety for bicyclists and pedestrians, which are particularly vulnerable to conflicts with vehicles on shared facilities, by providing a pathway separated from general traffic. Provide connectivity to the City of Punta Gorda's neighborhoods with the region's bicycle and pedestrian amenities, parks and recreational facilities, and conservation lands in the area. The need for the proposed shared use path project is based on the following criteria:

- Area Wide Network / System Linkage: Improve bicycle and pedestrian mobility
- Safety Conditions: Enhance safety along the corridor
- Social and Economic Demand: Improve bicycle and pedestrian accessibility

The Taylor Road Project is the MPO's number one project priority for the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP). The project has been programmed in two segments because of the complexity of the roadway. The first segment, Taylor Road from Jones Loop Road to Airport Road is programmed for Design in FY 2023/2024 for \$656,521. The estimated construction cost is \$5.1 million dollars. The second segment, Taylor Road from US 41 (South) to Jones Loop Road is currently not programmed in FDOT'S Five Year Work Program beyond the PD&E Study.

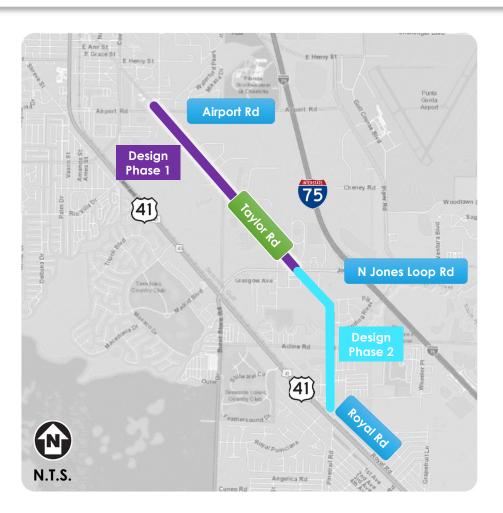

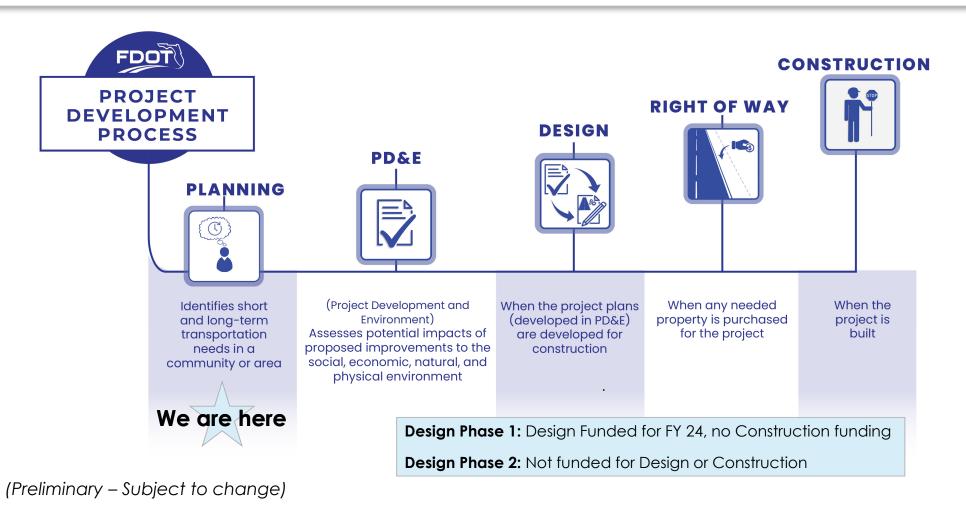

Discussion:

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District One, is conducting a Corridor Planning Study for Veterans Boulevard between US 41 and Kings Highway in Charlotte County, Florida. The subject corridor is a 6.9-mile, 4-lane divided roadway. The overall objective of this study is to improve mobility, safety, reliability, and connectivity for people who drive, walk, bike, and use transit within the study corridor.

This study will document the following:

- 1) Existing conditions including corridor characteristics, travel patterns, operational analysis of all modes, and safety assessment
- 2) Future conditions including traffic forecasts, access management review (for 2045), operational analysis of all modes and safety analysis, to develop potential safety, operational, and multimodal improvements for the Veterans Boulevard corridor. The identified improvements will be prioritized for short-term (2025), mid-term (2035), and long-term (2045) conditions through close coordination with the Project Steering Committee. The proposed recommendations are subject to change and will be implemented by Charlotte County Staff contingent upon the availability of funds.

Based on the results of the existing and future conditions analysis recommendations (based on safety, operational, and multi-modal) along Veterans Boulevard within the study limits will be developed. These recommendations that are presented today include (but are not limited to) signalization, mid-block crosswalks, access management, intersection lighting, basic and enhanced intersection improvements, and improved signage.

The Draft recommendations were presented at the July 6, 2022, TAC/ CAC meetings. The committees' recommendations were included in this report that will be presented today. FDOT Staff will return to the October 17, 2022 MPO Board Meeting to provide Final Draft recommendations to the MPO Board meeting for their review and approval.

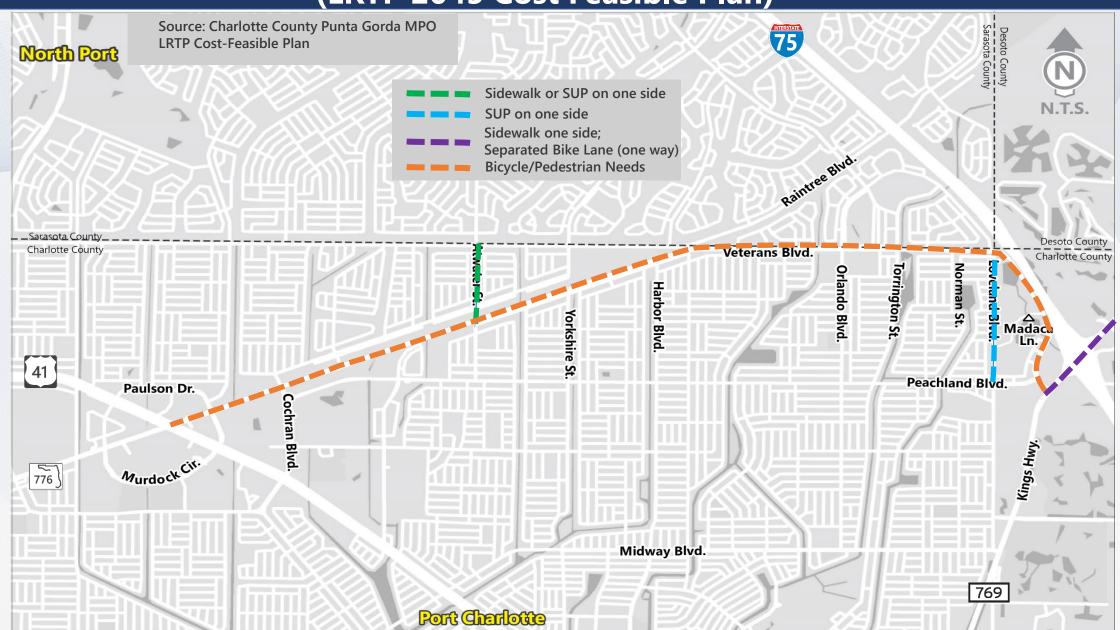
Capital Improvement Program 2020 – Road Paving Schedule

 Rideshare subsidies for trips within a two-mile radius around Port Charlotte Town Center starting in 2024



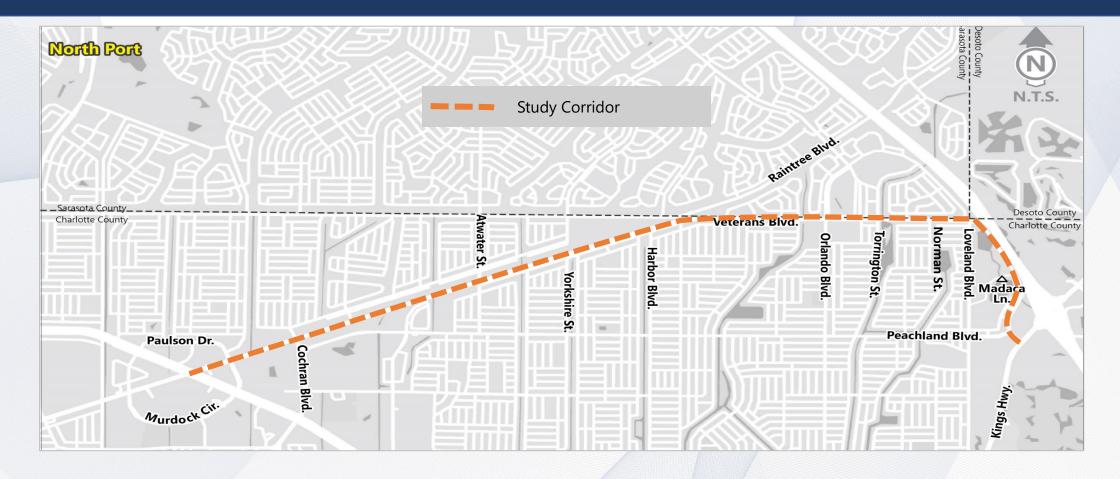

Discussion:

Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is preparing a grant application to the United States Department of Transportation (U.S. DOT) for consideration of grant funding to develop a Charlotte County Comprehensive Safety Action Plan.

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) established the new Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) discretionary grant program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over the next 5 years. In fiscal year 2022 (FY22), up to \$1 billion is available. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries.

The U.S. DOT announced the Notice of Funding Opportunity for the Safe Streets and Roads for All grant opportunity on May 16, 2022 and the application deadline is September 15, 2022.

Recommendation: Motion to approve MPO Board Resolution 2022-05 for

signature by the MPO Chair and to authorize the MPO Director to forward the Safe Streets for All Grant Application to the United States Department of

Transportation for consideration of funding to implement a Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Comprehensive Safety

Action Plan.

"Comprehensive Safety Action Plan" Defined

The term "comprehensive safety action plan" means a plan aimed at preventing transportationrelated fatalities and serious injuries in a locality, commonly referred to as a "Vision Zero" or "Toward Zero Deaths" plan, that may include—

- (A) a goal and timeline for eliminating fatalities and serious injuries;
- (B) an analysis of the location and severity of vehicle-involved crashes in a locality;
- (C) an analysis of community input, gathered through public outreach and education;
- (D)a data-driven approach to identify projects or strategies to prevent fatalities and serious injuries in a locality, such as those involving—
 - (i) education and community outreach;
 - (ii) effective methods to enforce traffic laws and regulations;
 - (iii) new vehicle or other transportation-related technologies; and
 - (iv) roadway planning and design; and
- (E)mechanisms for evaluating the outcomes and effectiveness of the comprehensive safety action plan, including the means by which that effectiveness will be reported to residents in a locality.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Metropolitan Planning Organization that:

- 1. The MPO Board will support the implementation of a Charlotte County-Punta Gorda Comprehensive Safety Action Plan; and
- 2. The MPO Board will support a Vision Zero and Safe System Approach into its plans, policies, and department activities; and
- 3. The MPO Board will support a Safe System Approach Working Group or Task Force tasked with coordinating safety improvements, to advance local priorities that will make streets safer for the traveling public, and to leverage technical assistance in reducing fatal and serious injury crashes by 2045.

I know I missed the deadline for comments for today's meeting regarding Bermont Road in Punta Gorda and unfortunately, I am not able to attend

My name Marchella D'Antuono and I reside at 46660 Bermont Road. I read the article about the several deadly crashes along this road and I also wanted to mention that SR 31/ Babcock Ranch Road that intersects with this is also extremely deadly. I drive both roads on a weekly basis and I feel like Babcock Ranch Road/ SR31---running north / south and south of this intersection is even WORSE than Bermont Road! It has more traffic. More semi trucks and more cars! There have been SEVERAL occasions, including just last week, where I have almost gotten into a head on collision because a vehicle was trying to pass a semi truck. This is also just a 2 lane road, heavily traveled by tractor trailors. Cars are ALWAYS speeding and trying to pass them. I have had to pull over onto the grass (there is no break down lane!) on several occasions. I have had to call 911 several years back because it was raining and a car lost control, over corrected to try to avoid hitting me head on and FLIPPED over! I was extremely shaken up for a long time! Every time I drive down either of these roads I feel like I am playing Russian Roulette!

Not only me but my son, my nephew, my husband each individually have all gotten into "almost" head on collisions, where they had to swerve off the side of the road to avoid someone.

Add the heavy rains we get in the summer and it is terrifying! The indentations into the hot pavement from the semi trucks fill up with water & if you don't drive off to the side of them, you will hydroplane.

My neighbors and I always talk about this and they too have all almost gotten into an accident! PLEASE do something about these 2 roads!

I hope this has a chance to make t to your meeting.
