1. Call to Order & Roll Call

Chair Dianne Quilty called the CAC Meeting to order at 1:30 pm. A quorum was present.

2. <u>Pledge of Allegiance</u>

All attendees recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. Public Comments on Agenda Items

There were no public comments received.

4. <u>Election of 2024 Officers</u>

The CAC Bylaws require that the election of the CAC Chair and Vice Chair occur annually. The CAC Chair presides at all CAC meetings and is responsible for pertinent correspondence and information releases. The CAC Vice Chair assumes the Chair's duties in the absence of the Chair and performs other duties assigned by the Chair.

All voting CAC members are eligible to be nominated. Election shall be by a majority vote of the attending CAC voting members.

D'Juan Harris assumed chairing the meeting and asked for nominations for CAC Chair.

Pauline Klein nominated *Diane Quilty* as CAC Chair. There were no other nominations. *Diane Quilty* was elected unanimously.

Diane Quilty resumed chairing the meeting and asked for nominations for CAC Vice Chair.

Pauline Klein nominated **Steven Hurt** to serve as CAC Vice Chair. There were no other nominations. **Steven Hurt** was elected unanimously.

5. <u>Reports</u>

A. Chair's Report

CAC Chair Quilty reviewed the highlights from the MPO Board Meeting, including discussions on Sunseeker Resort access and egress, lighting replacements on major roadways, a BPAC request for consideration of a flashing signal at Quesada Avenue and Forrest Nelson, plans for right turn on red lane revisions on Harborview Road at US 41, and discussions regarding the installation of an additional turn lane at the Sports Park for use only during events. She provided a summary of her report notes to MPO staff.

B. City of Punta Gorda Report

Brittany Metzler had no report. However, she and MPO staff responded to a question regarding an FDOT project in the vicinity of US 41 and Carmalita Street in Punta Gorda.

Discussion followed regarding the use of golf carts in downtown Punta Gorda. The timeline for the roundabout work at US 41 and Carmalita Street in the area of the Chase Bank was requested. Pam Barr promised to obtain an update from the FDOT project manager.

C. <u>Charlotte County Report</u>

Ravi Kamarajugadda had nothing to report. A question arose regarding the expensive costs (\$10 million) charged for utilities relocation on the Harbor View Road project.

D. <u>Sheriff's Report</u>

There was no report from the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office.

6. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Report

Pam Barr reported on the recent Public Hearing held for FDOT's Draft Tentative Work Program. FDOT is still taking comments. She discussed some key projects which have been programmed for funding:

- Charlotte Sports Park (Congestion Management)
- SR 776 at Flamingo Boulevard
- Jones Loop Road (currently funded as a Local Agency Project) still under discussion regarding this project category.

Pam Barr gave special thanks to MPO Staff for assisting with pulling the projects list together.

7. Consent Agenda:

A. <u>Approval of Minutes: September 27, 2023 Meeting</u>

Bob Logan made a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. **Richard Kirchhoff** seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

8. <u>FDOT Draft Tentative Five-Year Work Program FY 2025 through 2029</u>

The MPO Board and Advisory Committees annually review FDOT's Draft Tentative Work Program, which includes the new fifth year (FY 2029) of project programming based upon State and MPO priorities. This is an opportunity for the committee to review and provide comments on the FDOT's Draft Tentative Work Program.

The Draft Tentative Work Program will form the basis for the MPO's next Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to be adopted and submitted to FDOT by July 15, 2024. For federal funding to flow to the state and local governments, the TIP and FDOT's Work Program must be consistent. The following <u>video</u> was shown, and items were discussed:

> 1. <u>FDOT District One Draft Tentative Work Program FY 2025</u> <u>through FY 2029</u>

- 2. <u>Summary of Additions, Rescheduling and Deletions for</u> <u>Charlotte County</u>
- 3. Charlotte County Project Highlights Presentation

CAC Members were asked to review and comment on the FDOT District One Draft Tentative Work Program FY 2025 - FY 2029 for Charlotte County following the short video presentation. Pam Barr noted that FDOT District One was experiencing many fiscal constraints despite new federal infrastructure legislation funding. Discussion followed on transportation funding strategies and the impacts of the evolution of electric and hybrid vehicles.

D'Juan Harris requested additional comments for a letter that he is drafting regarding the Draft Tentative 5-Year Work Program. He also used the new mapping tool to discuss the following projects:

- Jones Loop Road and Piper Road Roundabout project and discussions on assignment of project management.
- I-75 Jones Loop Truck Parking Facility (where the park and ride project may be eliminated)
- US 41 Northbound at South Fork Alligator Creek Pedestrian/Wildlife Overpass project (where a Sun Trails project has been requested)
- ADA Ramp from Harborwalk to West Retta Esplanade project.

Ravi Kamarajugadda agreed to share information regarding concern about the high volume of left turns onto Piper Road and the proposed timelines of the first two projects above.

Other Discussion items:

(1) Dianne Quilty inquired if a pedestrian signal could be installed at Retta Esplanade to avert a dangerous pedestrian crossing condition. D'Juan Harris indicated that he would include in his comments letter to FDOT on the Draft Tentative Work Program, a request to FDOT for a Pedestrian Rapid Flashing Beacon (RFB) at Retta Esplanade.

(2) Richard Kirchoff indicated that Gasparilla Road South of SR 776 would need some improvements soon to keep pace with areas rapid growth.

(3) South Gulf Cove Rotunda improvements needed given population growth (including Boca Grande area) and stop light issues (further south than recent improvements at Marathon Boulevard). Laks Gurram reviewed planning efforts in the current Long Range Transportation Plan for the area. Steve Schoff described new developments impacting San Casa Drive. Pauline Klein also noted growth in the Charlotte Harbor area.

9. 2050 Socio-Economic (SE) Data Development - Final Update

On June 28, 2023, Kimley Horn & Associates briefed the advisory committee members on the 2050 socioeconomic data development process (population and employment). The committee was informed about control totals and the phases involved in the development of the forecast.

CAC Meeting Minutes November 8, 2023 The consultant met with the MPO and local jurisdiction staff on September 21, 2023, and October 30, 2023 to identify the growth in the Charlotte County at the TAZ levels and address any discrepancies in the forecast for 2050. The data will be revised based on comments received. The project is scheduled to be completed by December 2023.

Brett Kamm gave a brief update on the SE Data. He enjoyed working with County and MPO staff to develop an accurate data set. Laks Gurram was confident that this final version includes all County developments and will be invaluable in LRTP preparation.

Steve Schoff made a motion to recommend that the MPO Board adopt the 2050 SE Data forecast. *Bob Logan* seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

10. 2024 FDOT Safety Performance Measures Discussion

MPOs are required annually to adopt Safety Performance Measure Targets for tracking progress towards the Statewide/MPO targets for each of the transportation performance measures and meet Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) requirements.

FHWA has established five national Safety Performance Measures which all State Departments of Transportation and MPOs must address. Unlike other performance measures applicable only to the National Highway System (NHS), the Safety Performance Measures apply to all public roads. The 2024 Safety Performance Measures and target goals are listed in the table below:

2024 Safety Performance Measures

The MPO Board last adopted the FDOT's "Vision Zero" targets (goal of no fatalities or injuries) for all five of the Safety Performance Measures at the December 15, 2022, MPO Board Meeting. The MPO has until February 27, 2024 to accept the FDOT targets for 2024 or develop its own targets. MPO Staff recommends the MPO Board support and adopt FDOT's 2024 targets.

The heat map was discussed: <u>2022 Heat Map of Crashes in Charlotte County – Five Year</u> <u>Crash Data 2018 through 2022</u> D'Juan Harris described how it would relate to the Safe Streets and Roads for All Comprehensive Safety Action plan development and subsequent project funding. CAC Meeting Minutes November 8, 2023 **Bob Logan** made a motion to recommend MPO Board approval of the 2024 Safety Performance Measures and Target Goals. **Pauline Klein** seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

11. Freight Mobility & Trade Plan Updates

The Freight Mobility & Trade Plan (FMTP) is a comprehensive plan that identifies freight transportation facilities developed according to federal authorization under MAP – 21. A state Freight Plan is required under the FAST Act, to receive funding under the National Highway Freight Program (23 U.S.C. 167)

FDOT's Consultants, Andrew Nicol and Matt McIntosh with TranSystems, provided an overview of freight-related activities in Charlotte County and around the State of Florida. The MPO Board will be briefed at the at the December 16, 2023, MPO Board Meeting for their input. Their presentation was done via Teams:

12. Charlotte County Advance Traffic Management System (ATMS)

Laks Gurram introduced Richard Lisenbee from the Charlotte County Public Works Lighting District group which primarily manages the County's traffic signals in addition to street lighting.

Richard Lisenbee gave an overview of the County's Advanced Traffic Management Systems signal system. He also delivered a live demonstration of the County's various video detection systems, Pan-Tilt-Zoom (PTZ) cameras and the software that is utilized for developing signal timings. He noted challenges that are periodically experienced by staff, such as when I-75 experiences closure and when Hurricane Ian response necessitated retiming of US 17 traffic flow to benefit Charlotte and Lee Counties. A major challenge is timing Kings Highway, Peachland Boulevard and Veteran's Boulevard. He praised the work of a small staff at Public Works who can make signal timing adjustments remotely. The staff maintains the signals for all State, County and City of Punta Gorda roadways. Discussion of conductive loops occurred, as well as downstream and upstream loops. All video is real time only, so no recordings are made. Staff also utilizes Google Maps and law enforcement scanners to monitor traffic incidents.

A suggestion arose regarding the possibility of Charlotte County seeking grant funding to procure a costly signal timing system to benefit emergency vehicles when responding. The system allows for emergency signal adjustments. This had been done successfully in Lee County through grant funding.

Design challenges from a series of closely located signals around Cochran Boulevard and Veterans Boulevard. (Home Depot area in Port Charlotte) were discussed. Also mentioned was the issue of needed sign replacement for the many Hurricane Ian damaged ones.

13. Public Comments

There were no public comments.

14. Staff Comments

Laks Gurram displayed a video taken at the I-75 Harbor View Road exit two days prior to the passage of Hurricane Ian and expressed the stress on local roads whenever there is an incident on I-75. He informed about a public meeting scheduled by FDOT to reevaluate changes to the PD&E phase of the Harbor View Road widening project. The workshop will be on December 5, 2023, at the Punta Gorda Isles Civic Association from 5:00-6:00 pm.

Laks Gurram discussed the future Brightline rail extension from Orlando to Tampa. The four MPOs in the Southwest Florida region (Collier/Lee County/Charlotte County-Punta Gorda and Sarasota/Manatee) are coordinating requesting a Feasibility Study for providing service from Tampa to Naples. Lee MPO Staff will be taking a lead to apply for a Feasibility Study.

Laks Gurram discussed upcoming LRTP 2050 efforts and noted that CAC Members would be involved with the document's development. Bekie Leslie stated that there is currently one vacancy on the CAC for a West County representative. Both Pauline Klein and Steven Hurt have reapplied for their positions, and to date, there were no other applicants for their positions.

15. Member Comments

Bob Logan inquired about possible improvements to the US 41 southbound turn lane onto Melbourne Street in the Sunseeker Resort area. Laks Gurram stated that the issue is currently under review. He noted that the MPO was involved with a FDOT planning study of the general area from Kings Highway to the north end of the US 41 bridges, and the Melbourne Street issue would be considered in the study. Pam Barr stated that both a temporary and permanent signal at the entrance to Sunseeker Resort were currently being reviewed. Dianne Quilty noted that the MPO Board had asked for a diagram of the Sunseeker signal plans at the December 18, 2023 Meeting.

Steve Schoff commented on SR 776 and CR 771 by reading and submitting the following summary of data he collected regarding "<u>West County State Road Street Lighting Informal Functionality Survey</u>". He indicated that there are only two functioning streetlights in a 6.8 mile stretch of highway. He described the level of functionality and the specific locations of need along this corridor. These areas include Pine Street SB, SR 775 Placida Road SB, CR 771 Gasparilla Road SB, Winchester Boulevard, SR 776 S McCall Rd to CR 771 West to East. The situation was brought on by Hurricane Ian. He noted that many mast arms have swiveled 45-90 degrees which could be a safety issue. He stated that West County roadways are mostly dark at night. Similar situations were described by CAC Members in the areas of Harbor View Road and Harbor Heights.

Steve Hurt advocated for a traffic light at the intersection of Harbor View Road and Oakview Road as part of the widening project. Laks Gurram suggested that the issue be brought up at

the Harbor View Road Public Meeting on December 5, 2023. Pauline Klein noted that there was a bicyclist fatality at that location and numerous previous accidents recently.

James Kunard would like to see a new "Follow Up" section on the agenda which would be a list of items and requested information and topics from CAC Members at prior meetings for staff to convey responses. Laks Gurram offered to discuss this suggestion with D'Juan Harris. Laks Gurram also addressed the history of Aqui Esta Drive roadway improvements.

Mary Ellen Kiss sent an email (read by Dianne Quilty) with questions involving Burnt Store Road and Vincent Road. Laks Gurram stated that D'Juan Harris had reviewed her email and would be responding to her questions. Other CAC Members wished to receive a copy of the staff response (as long as this was permissible under the Sunshine Law).

16. Adjournment (Next CAC Meeting – March 6, 2024)

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 3:54 p.m. The next regularly scheduled CAC meeting will be held on Wednesday, March 6, 2024 in-person at the Charlotte Community Foundation, 227 Sullivan Street, Punta Gorda, Florida 33950 at 1:30 p.m.

Chair Austin thanked the Technical Advisory Committee for allowing him to continue to serve as Chair.

5. Consent Agenda:

A. Approval of Minutes: September 27, 2023 Meeting

Don Scott made a motion to approve the minutes. **Tony Conte** seconded the motion, and it was passed unanimously.

6. Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Report

Pam Barr reported on the October 18, 2023 Public Hearing for FDOT's Draft Tentative Work Program. The Work Program is currently in the public comment phase. MPO Staff provided initial feedback on the work program. She discussed some key projects which have been programmed for funding during this work program cycle:

- Charlotte Sports Park (Congestion Management)
- SR 776 at Flamingo Boulevard

• Jones Loop Road is currently programmed as a Local Agency Project. FDOT is currently discussing if this is an appropriate strategy to deliver this project, since portions of the project limits encroach into FDOT's limited access right-of-way.

Pam Barr thanked MPO Staff for their coordination efforts during this work program development cycle.

VItor Suguri FDOT, Community Planner and SIS Coordinator, informed the TAC that FDOT's District 1 Planning Studio has introduced a new staff level initiative.

Vitor indicated that the purpose of this initiative is to have meaningful dialogue with local entities early in the planning phase to avoid conflicts during development of transportation infrastructure. This enhanced coordination effort will open communication regarding hot spots, trends for future growth and allow for the alignment of plans. Funds are limited; however this strategy will provide a collaborative approach to help keep projects in the production pipeline moving forward. Legislative and comprehensive plan language will be reviewed with a focus on current the land use transportation connection.

Mr. Suguri will be in contact with other local agencies in early 2024. Chair Austin agreed and noted a good transportation plan is a good land use plan and looks forward to collaborating with FDOT.

Director Harris informed the committee, that the four MPO's in Southwest Florida: Sarasota/Manatee, Charlotte, Lee and Collier will collaborate to submit an application to MPOAC to fund a SW Florida passenger rail feasibility study.

7. FDOT Draft Tentative Five-Year Work Program FY 2025 through FY 2029

FDOT Five-Year Work Program Video Shown

Pamela Barr reviewed the phases of the work program and how projects are programmed for funding. The work program cycles open in July and end in the September/October depending on the Legislature.

Members were encouraged to review and send any comments to Director Harris for submission to FDOT.

Robert Fakhri commented on the need for updated cost estimates, the possible additional second east bound right turn lane on SR 776 & Charlotte Sports Park. He informed that County Staff provided other comments which he will forward to Director Harris.

Director Harris will include these comments in a formal letter to FDOT.

Pam Barr indicated that funding is constrained, and in the future all resurfacing or pavement only projects (POP) which will resurfacing alone with no improvements related to signs, lights, other improvements.

D'Juan Harris presented a PowerPoint highlighting some projects which have been programmed for funding in the Five-Year Work Program:

- Jones Loop Road and Piper Road Roundabout project and discussions on assignment of project management.
- I-75 Jones Loop Truck Parking Facility (where the park and ride portion of this project may be eliminated)
- US 41 Northbound at South Fork Alligator Creek Pedestrian/Wildlife Overpass project (additional SUN Trails funding being requested)

• ADA Ramp access from Harborwalk to West Retta Esplanade project. Ravi Kamarajugadda expressed concerns with the current situation at the Jones Loop and Piper Road project.

8. <u>2050 Socio-Economic (SE) Data Development – Final Update</u>

Laks Gurram introduced Brett Kamm of Kimley-Horn. Brett is actively coordinating with the MPO and local jurisdictions in Charlotte County to identify the growth patterns in the county at the TAZ levels. Lastly, Kimley-Horn will utilize this data to address any discrepancies in the forecast for 2050.

Brett Kamm gave a brief update on the SE Data. Laks Gurram was confident that this final version includes all pertinent impending developments in Charlotte County. This comprehensive data will be vital during development of the MPO's 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP).

On June 28, 2023, Kimley Horn & Associates briefed the advisory committee members on the 2050 socioeconomic data development process (population and employment). The committee was informed about control totals and the phases involved in the development of the forecast. The project is scheduled to be completed by December 2023

Chair Austin noted that the city is also actively coordinating with Kimley-Horn.

Ravi Kamarajugadda mentioned the County plans to submit comments soon, there were some areas that required clarification such as, Burnt Store Road, West Port and West County.

Laks Gurram encouraged committee members to submit comments, questions, or feedback so they can be addressed by the consultants.

Ravi Kamarajugadda made a motion to recommend that the MPO Board adopt the 2050 SE Data forecast with adjustments as needed. **Don Scott** seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

9. <u>Charlotte County Advanced Traffic Management Systems</u>

D'Juan Harris introduced Richard Lisenbee from the Charlotte County Public Works Lighting District group which primarily manages the County's traffic signals in addition to street lighting. Mr. Lisenbee introduced Jody Mansell, the New Superintendent for Charlotte County Lighting Division.

Richard Lisenbee gave an overview of the County's Advanced Traffic Management Systems signal system. He also delivered a live demonstration of the County's various video detection systems, Pan-Tilt-Zoom (PTZ) cameras and the software that is utilized for developing signal timings. He noted challenges that are periodically experienced by staff, such as when I-75 experiences closure and when Hurricane Ian response necessitated retiming of traffic signals. He discussed how an incident in one location could have a domino effect creating back up in other locations.

A major challenge is timing around Kings Highway, Peachland Blvd, and Veteran's Blvd. He praised the work of Public Works staff who have the ability to make signal timing adjustments remotely. The staff maintains the signals for all State, County and City of Punta Gorda roadways. All video recording is real time only. Staff also utilizes Google Maps and law enforcement scanners to monitor traffic incidents.

There was a brief discussion on the traffic cameras whether they could do used for Pedestrian and Bicyclist counts. It was noted the cameras used primarily capture vehicles; although some cameras could capture pedestrians depending on the camera mounting location.

Design challenges from a series of closely located signals around Cochran Blvd and Veterans Blvd (Home Depot area in Port Charlotte) were discussed. System updates are ongoing, but funding is limited.

10. 2024 FDOT Safety Performance Measures Discussion

Director Harris indicted that MPOs are required annually to adopt Safety Performance Measure Targets for tracking progress towards the Statewide target for each of the transportation performance measures and meet Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) requirements.

FHWA has established five national Safety Performance Measures which all State Departments of Transportation and MPOs must address. Unlike other performance

measures applicable only to the National Highway System (NHS), the Safety Performance Measures apply to all public roads.

D'Juan Harris noted as we move forward in developing the Safe Streets and Roads For All Comprehensive Safety Action Plan, the areas of concern as defined by the High Injury Network (HIN) will be thoroughly analyzed.

Don Scott made a motion to recommend MPO Board approval of the 2024 Safety Performance Measures and Target Goals. **Ravi Kamarajugadda** seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

11. Freight Mobility & Trade Plan Updates

Laks Gurram introduced FDOT's Consultant Andrew Nicol with TranSystems, who provided an overview of freight-related activities in Charlotte County and around the State of Florida.

The Freight Mobility & Trade Plan (FMTP) is a comprehensive plan that identifies freight transportation facilities developed according to federal authorization under MAP – 21. A state Freight Plan is required under FAST Act, to receive funding under the National Highway Freight Program (23 U.S.C. 167)

He presented a conceptual drawing for three Truck Parking Facilities proposed in FDOT District One. The locations are as follows:

- I-75 & Jones Loop Road Rest Area
- I-75 & Daniels Parkway Rest Area
- I- 4 Rest Area.

There was a brief discussion regarding the Jones Loop Truck parking Facility, the rehabilitation of the currently closed rest area in Charlotte County is proposed to include 212 truck parking spaces.

Chair Austin recommended to consider US 17 in the study since there are many trucks that pass through the city in downtown area. Piper Road and Jones Loop Road make a great US 17 alternate and the wayfinding signs would give the truckers a preferred route,

Robert Fakhri expressed his concerns with truckers using local roads that avoid the weigh station and the damages caused to roadways and signage. He also expressed concerns of truck enforcement in the area.

The MPO Board will be briefed at the at the December 16, 2023, MPO Board Meeting for their input.

MPO Staff thanked Chair Austin and the Committee for the great conversations during this meeting.

It will be held at the Punta Gorda Isles Civic Association from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Mr. Harris provided an e-mail blast to all of Charlotte County's transportation planning partners to inform them of the upcoming Public Hearing.

He also shared drone footage taken showing what happens to Charlotte County's local roadway network when an incident occurs on the interstate that requires a traffic detour.

7. FDOT Bicycle/Pedestrian Coordinator Report

Tanya Merkle reminded everyone the deadline for SUN Trails applications is 2:00 p.m. on December 20, 2023.

The new 2024 Florida Design Manual (FDM) is now available online, she highlighted a few design changes made for Bicycle Pedestrian facilities. There was a brief discussion on sloped curb bicycle lanes to encourage cyclists to ride closer to the curb and further from motorists, allowing them to feel safer in the bike lane.

SUN Trails – there are a few SUN trails projects in the process for funding; such as Myakka Forrest to US 41 which is programmed for Design, County Staff is working to revise cost estimates and will submit an application with the updated estimates. There are some projects along the SUN Trail network, which are not funded through this program, they are funded as transportation alternatives. There are discussions with FDOT on whether these facilities could be designed to SUN Trails standards which are 12' wide and asphalt paths. It was noted there are some gaps in the system and each year they seek to add projects to close these gaps in facilities.

Chair Wernicke discussed some concerns noted not in Charlotte but in Sarasota Countyspecifically the Ponce De Leon Blvd overpass on I 75 and raised issues with Debris on the overpass Ms. Merkle noted each overpass may have a different agreement in place for maintaining these facilities, they would have to be looked individually. Although the State may have constructed the overpass, local municipalities usually maintain them.

There was a brief discussion regarding the right lane in front of Sunseekers which is currently closed. Director Harris noted this is a temporary closure, they are modifying the entrance and will place a temporary traffic signal in place.

8. <u>Sheriffs' Office Report-Public Safety</u>

The Committee reviewed the Sheriff's report; Deputy Miller was unable to attend.

9. Charlotte County Report

Ravi Kamarajugadda has nothing to report.

Building #103 – Staff received a GMP quote of \$248,633 for interior repairs. This is the final PO needed to complete this building. Funding is by Insurance, CCAA and FEMA.

Staff Recommended Action – The Board accepts the scope of work and fee in the amount of \$248,633 and allows the CEO to execute the contract.

Building #304 - Staff received a GMP quote of \$250,000 for interior repairs. Funding is by Insurance, and CCAA.

Staff Recommended Action – The Board accepts the scope of work and fee in the amount of not to exceed \$250,000 and allows the CEO to execute the contract.

Building #313 - Building #313 - Staff received a GMP quote of \$250,000 for interior repairs. Funding is by Insurance, and CCAA.

Staff Recommended Action – The Board accepts the scope of work and fee in the amount of not to exceed \$250,000 and allows the CEO to execute the contract.

Hangar 208 Door Replacement - Hangar 208 suffered damage to the hangar door during hurricane Ian. After having multiple contractors inspect the door, only Target Solutions provided a quote to replace the hangar door at a cost not exceeding \$238,267.45. Funding is by Insurance, and CCAA.

Staff recommendation: Board authorizes staff to award contract to Target Solutions for replacement of Hangar 208 door as presented.

Fuel Farm Access Security Enhancements – Amendment to Design Contract – After review of the Final Plans which were submitted to Staff on October 5, 2023, it was discovered that the Engineer's Opinion of Probable Costs far exceeded the project budget due to significant stormwater updates which was required as a result of the roadway alignment. Staff met with Kimley-Horn on October 24, 2023, to discuss steps to move forward with the project. It was determined that the road would have to be redirected to reduce impacts with the stormwater system. As a result, on November 1, 2023, Kimley-Horn presented staff with a contract amendment for the redesign of the road. Funding by FDOT and CCAA. **Staff Recommended Action:** Board authorizes the CEO to execute a contract amendment with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$23,830.

Title VI Plan - The FAA is requiring all airports to submit a Title VI Plan. Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, CCAA assures that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, creed, or age be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination. This plan outlines demographic data from our surrounding communities and the steps we will take to ensure non-discrimination during airport programs/projects/activities. **Staff Recommended Action:** Board adopt the Title VI Plan.

2023 Starcraft Allstar 24' Shuttle Bus - You will recall from this year's budget that the board approved an amount of \$135,000 for the purchase of a shuttle bus to replace an existing bus that is at its end of life. Staff received a state contract quote of \$130,745 for purchase of the bus which is less than the budgeted amount. **Staff Recommendation:** Board authorizes staff to purchase a shuttle bus in an amount not to exceed \$135,000 as presented.

Ground Support Equipment:

Within the FY 2023 – 2024 Capital Budget, \$250,000.00 worth of ground support
equipment (GSE) was approved for purchase. Staff solicited quotes from five
separate GSE providers, including AES, Aeroservicios USA, Aviation GSE,
Mercury and Xced. Aeroservicios, located in Miami, Florida provided the lowest
combined quote for all equipment requested, including the lowest quotes on a push
back tractor, baggage tug, and two beltloaders. They also were the only company
able to provide all six requested luggage carts and provide a new potable water cart
at a cost near their competitors refurbished cost. They also waived all shipping cost
and agreed to provide parts warranties on all equipment purchased. This equipment
will be used to support airline and charter operations leased by them on a per turn
basis at rates identified in CCAA Rates & Charges.

Staff Recommended Action: Board Authorize the CEO to procure a push back tractor, baggage tug, (2) beltloaders, (6) baggage carts, a lavatory cart, water cart, and tow bar from Aeroservicios USA for \$224,130.00.

Master Drainage Plan Consultant Selection: On October 10, 2023, RFQ-8-0-2023/CE was advertised requesting firms to submit qualification packages for the update to the Master Drainage Plan ERP Permit No. 49000164.025. On November 13, 2023, qualification packages were received.

Staff Recommended Action: Board authorizes Staff to begin development of the scope of work, fee, and schedule with the top ranked firm.

Taxiway "A" & "C" Reconstruction and Reconfiguration of Taxiway "C/D" Intersection–Amendment to Design Contract – On October 24, 2023, Staff and Kimley-Horn met with the FAA to discuss proposed pavement geometry for the project. Following the meeting, FAA provided CCAA direction to design the direct connect (with no TW D bypass) but with the inclusion of a future Taxiway D bypass to be designed as a bid alternate. As a result, on November 7, 2023, Kimley-Horn prepared a contract amendment to include the additional consulting and design effort associated with complying with FAA's request to design a direct connect taxiway (The Taxiway D bypass was already included in existing design scope of work.) Funding provided by FAA 90%, DOT 5% and CCAA 5% Staff Recommended Action: Board authorizes the CEO to execute a contract amendment with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$71,885.

PROJECT TITLE

Taxiway A/C Reconstruction and Taxiway C/D Intersection Improvements

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This design-bid-build project is comprised of three sub-projects. Sub-Project 1 will include the construction of a new bypass taxiway on Taxiway D by Taxiway C. Sub-Project 2 will include the reconstruction of Taxiway C (2,000' x 60') as well as the reconfiguration of the Taxiway intersection with Runway 15-33. Sub-Project 3 would include the reconstruction of a portion of Taxiway A from Runway 22 to Taxiway C (4,300' x 60'). Work elements will include pavement demolition, new pavement and lime rock base course, new signage and lighting, and earthwork.

STATUS OF PROJECT

On October 23 and October 24, CCAA met with the FAA to discuss phasing and design challenges associated with the C/D intersection and bypass Taxiway. CCAA discussed altering the hammerhead to include the southern bypass taxiway (in aqua on the ALP). Due to funding availability and estimated construction costs, the FAA agreed to remove any version of a bypass taxiway from the project. Taxiway C geometry would be corrected to provide a 90-degree connection to Runway 15-33 and would directly connect to Taxiway D. FAA requested that the southern bypass taxiway and partial hammerhead be bid as an alternate to the project so that it may be constructed if costs are within budget. On October 25, CCAA and ATCT met with Kimley Horn to discuss project phasing to reduce operational impacts. On October 30, CCAA met with Kimley Horn to confirm the future fleet mix for typical pavement design.

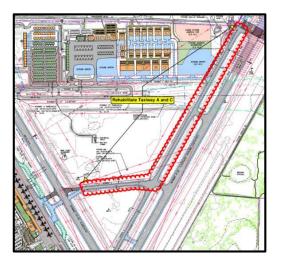

Commercial Terminal Expansion

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Expand and renovate the existing commercial terminal building to address the current need to provide more space and improve efficiency for handling passengers. The proposed terminal expansion project is anticipated to provide approximately 51,500 additional square feet of space for hold rooms, public circulation, public restrooms, and concessions. The project also includes the renovation of approximately 30,500 square feet of the existing terminal. These renovations will include modifying the existing hold room spaces into expanded security screening checkpoint space, queuing, public circulation, arrivals, concessions, and other support space.

The project also includes the relocation of aircraft parking positions, the relocation of drainage structures and any required grading modifications to the aircraft parking apron as a result of the relocation of the drainage structures, expanded terminal space/support building space, relocation of rental car ready spaces, and construction of a new access road.

The study confirms that the existing terminal space does not accommodate existing passenger enplanement levels. As information, the 2018 Master Plan Update forecasted that annual enplanements would be at 841,169 by the year 2036. Comparatively, in 2019, enplanements were 821,557. Following COVID in 2020, 2021 enplanements were 783,397. Year 2022 enplanements through October were 769,685. Using 2021 as a basis, PGD estimates 2023 enplanements to be approximately 939,861.

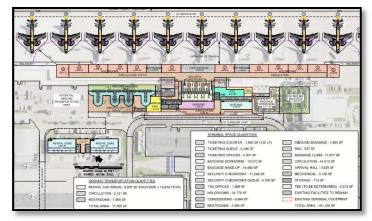
STATUS OF PROJECT

On April 13, 2023, the Board selected the Design-build firm of DeAngelis Diamond/AECOM. Currently the IFE and scope of work have been completed. Staff received FAA concurrence 8/18/23 for the design/build method. Staff submitted the ATP grant application early October (NOFO received 9/12/23). On September 24, 2023, The Airport executed an FDOT PTGA for \$25,000. Additional funding via amendments are expected in outer years. Staff has finalized a contract which will be submitted to the Board at the November Board Meeting.

CITY OF PUNTA GORDA REPORT TO THE MPO BOARD

DECEMBER 2023

Many City offices are still relocated due to damage. The City Manager's staff are in the Laishley Park Community Room. The Urban Design, Code, Zoning and Planning staff moved to rented office space at the Towles Plaza on U.S. 41 in Punta Gorda and will remain there until the offices in the Annex building are restored from hurricane damage.

Replacement of 7.25 miles of damaged seawalls continues within PGI and BSI. The City now has a project management consultant to oversee, inspect and document the seawall replacements. We are about 10% complete so far.

The City Hall renovation project is in design and engineering. The Council reviewed 90% plans, and costs continue to escalate. Construction is expected to begin in 2024.

Construction/demolition has begun at the Interactive Fountain area in Laishley Park. This work includes rehabilitation and upgrades to the splash pad/play area. To the highest extent possible the restroom facilities will remain open to the public. The access for the restrooms will be from the marina side of the building. There will be periodic temporary sidewalk closures immediately adjacent to the construction area as required for public safety. The construction area will be closed to the public at all times during this period. The enhanced fountain area is scheduled to reopen in May 2024.

The Boca Grande drainage project area is bound by Taylor Road to the north, Cooper St. to the east, Palmera Drive to the south and the Seminole Gulf Railway ditch to the west is in the queue to begin construction soon. The area encompasses about 105 acres of which approximately 25 acres are commercial with the remaining 80 acres consisting of low density residential. This is a master drainage plan for water quality and drainage improvements to include installation of stormwater piping and inlets installation, swale improvements and construction of a stormwater management area. The City continues to work with the consultant and Seminole Gulf Railway to move the project to construction.

The City continues to work with FEMA on funding of Hurricane lan repairs. City staff has completed inspections with FEMA staff on damaged sidewalks, street signs and lighting and await FEMA approval of projects to be reimbursed. Most street identification signs have been replaced with only about three known signs still needing replacement. Supplies have been received this week and the last three signs should be replaced within a week.

Construction continues on the replacement of the Ponce deLeon Park boardwalk and improvements to the fishing piers. The boardwalk and east fishing piers have been reopened to the public. The west fishing pier is now closed for rehabilitation.

The City has received the findings of the engineer's inspection of the Laishley Park fishing pier and sidewalk. The pier will be closed for the foreseeable future. At minimum, before it can be reopened, the decking must be replaced along with other repairs to include pile jackets and protective coatings on the pile caps.

Work continues on the City's annual swale maintenance program. Currently staff is working with the contractor to complete the few remaining areas from the FY 2023 list that were delayed due to Hurricane Ian. The videoing of the swales to establish the FY 2024 list has been completed and is under review. We anticipate having the list completed within the coming month.

The City's 2024 Legislative Priorities are focused on water quality initiatives, including partial reimbursement for the seawall restoration from Hurricane Ian, design/engineering for the septic to sewer project for Charlotte Park, and partial funding for the wastewater treatment plant enhancement project.

1. Call to Order & Roll Call

MPO Chair Constance called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. All board members were present.

2. <u>Invocation – Pastor Steve Glover – Deep Creek Community Church</u>

Pastor Steve Glover did not attend, so MPO Chair Constance gave the invocation.

3. <u>Pledge of Allegiance</u>

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

4. Addition and/or Deletion to the Agenda

There were no additions or deletions to the agenda.

Commissioner Tiseo made a motion to approve the agenda. *Mayor Matthews* seconded the motion. It was approved unanimously.

5. Public Comments on Agenda Items

There were no public comments.

6. PUBLIC MEETING: FY 2023/2024 - FY 2027/2028 TIP Roll Forward Amendment

The MPO staff received a request from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to amend the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO's FY 2023/2024 – FY 2027/2028 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). D'Juan Harris commented that for full public transparency purposes, projects programmed with federal funding that have residual funding remaining from the previous fiscal year (FY 2023) must be accounted for in the MPO's current Transportation Improvement Program. A roll call vote on the amendment was required. Specifically, the roll forward report includes projects in the previous state fiscal year that were not commenced, have uncommitted portions of projects that have started and or have funds remaining on completed projects. These projects automatically roll forward in FDOT's Work Program and need to be accounted for in the MPO's new TIP. This amendment is required to account for these projects (FDOT Charlotte County MPO Roll Forward Report) in the FY 2024 through FY 2028 TIP.

The Technical and Citizens' Advisory Committees formally reviewed and recommended MPO Board adoption of the FY 2023/2024 – FY 2027/2028 TIP as presented at their September 27, 2023 meetings. A Public Meeting was required to solicit public input.

Commissioner Tiseo made a motion to close the Public Meeting. *Commissioner Deutsch* seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

Mayor Matthews made a motion to amend the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO's TIP for FY 2023/2024 – FY 2027/2028 adding: Roll-forward projects from FY 2023/2024 which could not be obligated during the State's Fiscal Year ending June 30, 2023. *Commissioner Deutsch* seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken, and the motion carried unanimously.

7. Chairs' Reports:

A. MPO Board Chair's Report

MPO Chair Constance discussed an informational item, the Sunseeker Resort entrance's ongoing signal construction which was experiencing delays due to supply chain issues. He requested that MPO Board Members receive site plans for both interim (prior to signal installation) and final (once entry signal is installed) intersection construction. Mayor Matthews read into the record an email from Micah Richins, President/COO of Sunseeker Resorts: <u>Sunseeker 10 13</u> 2023 Email to Mayor Matthews . A hard copy of the email was provided to MPO Board Members. Commissioner Constance appreciated the Mayor's update giving the Resort's perspective. L.K. Nandam responded that there had been some delays on the part of the Sunseeker Resorts as well. He defended FDOT staff (from multiple offices) who had done and would continue to do their parts to expedite reviews. He noted that the interim solution occurred because of supply chain issues, and the box that directs the signal changes has been delayed. FDOT staff believed that the lack of a signal would not be an issue as the Sunseeker Resort opened for business, but FDOT would like to have it completed by that time.

Commissioner Tiseo asked if signalization had been required at the entrance location when the resort project was initially permitted. Wayne Gaither stated that it was his understanding when talking with County staff that the original intention was to locate the signal further north at the US 41 and Main Street intersection. The location later changed during the review process, moving the proposed signal to the Resort's main entrance/egress which was located further south on US 41. This had occurred more than a year ago. John Elias verified to Commissioner Tiseo that the resort's opening was not contingent upon having the signal in place. Commissioner Tiseo wondered how the Sunseeker Resort's current roadwork would work without a signal in place prior to final intersection completion. Commissioner Constance described the current interim construction at the location which included a long-left hand turn into a U shape, as well as the need to cut across two lanes of traffic. Commissioner Tiseo commented that members of the public would like to review some kind of site plan, since it was of great public interest. Commissioner Constance stated that various phases of the site plan were needed for informational purposes, since they were never taken before the Board of County Commissioners, the MPO or the press, and it was necessary to educate everyone on the matter. L.K. Nandam noted that there needs to be a joint presentation given to the MPO Board by County and FDOT staff. He discussed how FDOT develops approval based upon buildout which is triggered by traffic volume. Commissioner Constance noted that there was agreement to bring the matter back for discussion. He also welcomed L.K. Nandam back from his temporary work assignment in Tallahassee. Commissioner Constance asked John Elias to provide site plans for: (1) the original location (Main Steet), (2) the revised main entrance, and (3) the interim approach (prior to final signalization). This was particularly important, since many out of area visitors were being brought to the location very soon. Commissioner Deutsch believed the signal location

was changed about 2 ½ years ago. He felt that the FDOT review period of 30 days was reasonable (compared to federal agencies), and he was not concerned about the review. He stressed the need for the traffic light to be ordered promptly. He noted a problem at the left hand turn when coming south from Bayshore Road onto Main Street to access an employee/delivery entrance, where it was impossible for a truck to negotiate the turn without going over the median and damaging a sign. Commissioner Herston noted that in his opinion, the location does not meet County engineering standards. Commissioner Herston stated that perhaps some median reduction work could be accomplished. John Elias had reviewed the area and noted that it was a future pedestrian crossing area. Commissioner Herston applauded Wayne Gaither for his quick response previously in honoring his requests for information.

John Elias also responded to a request for information regarding FDOT roadway lighting work completion on SR 776. He stated that January or February 2024 was a more realistic estimate than previously stated for project completion of hurricane restoration work. All FPL-managed street lighting throughout Charlotte County has been restored. Since high pressure sodium lighting is no longer available, going forward all lighting will be done with LED.

Commissioner Constance distributed copies of a letter sent by Charlotte County Commissioner Ken Doherty on behalf of his County District One to Congressman Steube, Senator Rubio and Senator Scott. The letters were written in opposition to two legislative proposals to allow for much heavier tractor-trailer trucks on roadways. Discussion occurred regarding the accuracy of one figure and variation between letters. It was agreed that further discussion of these letters perhaps to be sent from the entire BCC needed to be placed on the upcoming BCC agenda. Commissioner Tiseo believed the topic might also be addressed in the County's legislative position statement. Commissioner Constance noted that opposition to the legislative proposals was also emanating from the National Association of Counties (NACO) and the Florida Association of Counties (FAC). Placement on the BCC agenda would allow for additional public discussion. Commissioner Herston offered to deliver a copy of the letters to the Florida Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council (MPOAC) Director at the MPOAC meeting on October 26, 2023.

B. Citizens' Advisory Committee (CAC) Chair's Report

CAC Chair Dianne Quilty reviewed September 27, 2023 CAC Meeting highlights:

- County staff member's report
- Discussion of East-West Connector (need to determine cost) US 41 and Burnt Store Road
- Sheriff's representative report on golf carts
- FDOT staff report on approval of Moving Florida Forward projects and discussion of Burnt Store Road improvements.
- Reverse use of Zemel Road as an alternate route for evacuation
- Economic Development report given by Dave Gammon including discussion of the Sunseeker Resort, Melbourne Street impacts (arrival of new Whiskey Joe's to compound traffic issues) including the upcoming traffic study for US 41 in that area and support for affordable workforce initiatives planning.
- Recommendations for all actionable agenda items moved forward by consensus.

- Development by D'Juan Harris and Betty-Ann Sherer of a project priority mapping tool based upon Google Maps which CAC Members noted was "cool" and "easy to use."
- Concerns with vegetation obscuring vision of drivers turning left from southbound US 41 onto Melbourne Street in front of traffic exiting the northbound US 41 bridge.

Commissioner Tiseo commented that East-West corridor discussions in the Burnt Store Road/US 41 area were still underway. The alternative design of a serpentine roadway was proposed due to the cost of Right-of-Way on another option and to provide an access road for development.

C. Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Chair's Report

D'Juan Harris gave the TAC report. He noted that Brittany Metzler with the City of Punta Gorda had been a stand-in meeting chair that day. A quorum had been obtained and all recommended action items had been approved. Three well received informational presentations had been given: Economic Development by Dave Gammon, Urban area boundary and functional classification by Kyle Purvis, and rollout of the mapping tool developed by D'Juan Harris and Betty-Ann Sherer that uses Google Maps and contains all project information (from production to construction). Responding to Commissioner Constance's inquiry, D'Juan Harris stated that no special software was needed, so users could access the information through a Google account.

D. <u>Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) Chair's Report</u>

BPAC Chair Pauline Klein reviewed the October 5, 2023 BPAC Meeting highlights:

- Quorum was present and all recommended actionable items were approved.
- Presentation by Tanya Merkle on roundabouts and vehicle interaction with bicyclists and pedestrians while using them.
- County report including a long discussion regarding Quesada Avenue and Forrest Nelson Blvd with a request made for a flashing sign at that intersection like the one located at Shreve Street and Marion Avenue
- City report regarding bike path connections.
- Enthusiasm for Betty-Ann Sherer's quiz game for BPAC Members centered upon bicycle rules which Members believed also could be used in schools.
- Discussion of upcoming MPO project priorities

8. Local Government Reports:

A. Charlotte County Airport Authority

Commissioner Herston, Charlotte County Airport Authority Vice Chairman, provided MPO Board Members with a verbal update. The last Airport Authority Meeting was held on September 21, 2023. It included a final budget hearing. A new firetruck costing \$2 million was funded through passenger fees. Taxiway reconstruction and taxiway intersection improvements were underway, as was lighting and a new hangar. Golf Course Blvd will no longer be a through street, and current traffic will be routed to Challenger Blvd. He also discussed a new Charlotte County Technical College (CTC) aviation training facility, a new in-line baggage system with four belts, and commercial terminal expansion which was in the design phase. The Florida International Air Show will be held on November 4 and 5, 2023 at the Punta Gorda Airport and will feature the USAF Thunderbirds. <u>Florida International Air Show (floridaairshow.com)</u> Airport operations figures were about even with the prior month. Passenger figures were roughly twenty thousand under a year ago. Fuel sales were steady. The airport's 50 destinations include some cities served year-round and others that are only seasonal. Secretary Nandam noted that FDOT is providing \$5 million for terminal expansion.

B. City of Punta Gorda

Mayor Matthews had provided the City of Punta Gorda report for the MPO Board agenda packet. Projects listed in the report were:

- Gilchrist Park/Harborwalk Phase II construction is complete, and the project has been transferred to the operation phase.
- Many City of Punta Gorda offices are still relocated due to damage. The City Manager's staff are in the Laishley Park Community Room. The Urban Design, Code, Zoning and Planning staff will be moving to rented office space at the Towles Plaza on U.S. 41 in Punta Gorda by the end of October and will remain there until the offices in the Annex building are restored from hurricane damage.
- Replacement of 7.25 miles of damaged seawalls continues within PGI and BSI. The City now has a project management consultant to oversee, inspect and document the seawall replacements.
- The Bayfront Center building in Gilchrist Park, which was destroyed in the hurricane will be demolished. The citizen's committee that met to compile a report with options for replacement of the facility has suggested the city acquire the IMPAC campus buildings to replace the Bayfront Center building. Discussions will take place with the owner of the property to see if this is feasible. More to come on this.
- The City Hall renovation project is in design and engineering. The Council will review 90% plans later this month. Construction is expected to begin late 2023.
- The Laishley Park Playground project has a new contractor to install the equipment and they have 180 days to do the project.
- The MPO was looking for community stakeholders in PG to form a task force for the upcoming Safe Streets and Roads for all Comprehensive Safety Action Plan. The MPO was given contact information for TEAM Punta Gorda, the PGICA, Historic district Civic Association, Burnt Store Isles Association, Burnt Store Meadows HOA, Seminole Lakes, and the PG Chamber of Commerce.
- The Boca Grande drainage project area is bound by Taylor Road to the north, Cooper St. to the east, Palmera Drive to the south and the Seminole Gulf Railway ditch to the west is in the queue to begin construction soon. The area encompasses about 105 acres of which approximately 25 acres are commercial with the remaining 80 acres consisting of low density residential. This is a master drainage plan for water quality and drainage improvements to include installation of stormwater piping and inlets installation, swale improvements and construction of a stormwater management area. The city continues to work with the consultant and Seminole Gulf Railway to move the project to construction.
- The city continues to work with FEMA on funding of Hurricane Ian repairs. City staff have most recently been performing inspections with FEMA staff on damaged sidewalks, street signs and lighting.

- The sidewalk along West William Street from the Cross Trails Plaza to the apartments west of the plaza has been completed.
- Construction continues on the replacement of the Ponce de Leon Park boardwalk and improvements to the fishing piers.
- The city has received the findings of the engineer's inspection of the Laishley Park fishing pier and sidewalk. The pier will be closed for the foreseeable future. At minimum, before it can be reopened, the decking has to be replaced along with other repairs to include pile jackets and protective coatings on the pile caps.
- The city has completed swale regrading at fifteen locations and continues work in additional locations as part of the annual swale program to improve drainage to areas that are not meeting the City's 72-hour level of service policy
- The channel markers damaged by the hurricane have been repaired/replaced as needed.
- Improvements to the Hounds on Henry Dog Park have been completed. New sod and fences added to accommodate an additional 5,000 square feet of space. This park continues to be one of the most popular parks in the city.

Mayor Matthews discussed a new item: 90% plans for City Hall and Freeman House. She noted that construction costs are escalating by the minute. They will be reviewed officially in November. Some City Staff will be relocating to Towles Plaza. Commissioner Constance asked about the Bayfront Center. An ad hoc citizens stakeholder committee had reviewed several options for replacement of the facility and unanimously recommended that the city investigate acquiring two of the three former IMPAC buildings (not including the one containing the Military Heritage Museum). Discussions are underway with a Fisherman's Village representative (not owner Jon Larmore). Commissioner Constance inquired about the possibility of rebuilding on the present site. Mayor Matthews stated that this would be cost prohibitive given FEMA building constraints. Commissioner Herston discussed the Boca Grande drainage project and the impacts of SB102 (Live Local Act) with a multi-family designation which would mean water quantity would change, but water quality would be unaffected. Mayor Matthews indicated that she would discuss this matter with the City Manager.

C. Charlotte County

Commissioner Tiseo provided the County report on the following items:

Various Intersection Improvements:

- County staff have reviewed and provided comments on 60% design plans for Veterans Blvd. ay Yorkshire intersection.
- Veterans Blvd at Cochran Blvd intersection 90% plans are due for review.
- Cochran Boulevard @ Quesada Avenue Northbound right turn on Quesada Avenue (completed)
- Murdock Circle @ US Highway 41 Eastbound right turn lane on Murdock Circle (completed)
- Cochran Boulevard @ Quesada Avenue Northbound right turn on Quesada Avenue (completed)

- Murdock Circle @ US Highway 41 Eastbound right turn lane on Murdock Circle (completed)
- Veterans Boulevard @ Cochran Boulevard intersection. 90% plans are due for review on October 13, 2023
- Veterans Boulevard @ Torrington Street intersection. 60% plans have been reviewed by Charlotte County staff and returned to FTE for updates. 90% plans are due for review on December 26, 2023
- Veterans Boulevard @ Loveland Boulevard intersection. 60% plans have been reviewed by Charlotte County staff and returned to FTE for updates. 90% plans are due for review on December 12, 2023
- Peachland Boulevard @ Harbor Boulevard intersection. Design survey has started. 60% plans are due for review on October 18, 2024
- Veterans Boulevard @ Atwater Street intersection. Design survey has started. 60% plans are due for review on June 06, 2024
- Veterans Boulevard @ Yorkshire Street intersection. Design survey has started. 60% plans are due for review on October 31, 2023
- Veterans Boulevard @ Harbor Boulevard intersection. Design survey has started. 60% plans are due for review on October 17, 2023
- Veterans Boulevard @ Orlando Boulevard intersection. Design survey has started. 60% plans are due for review on January 24, 2024

Charlotte Harbor CRA – Parmely Street Road Widening and Sidewalk:

Project Description:

This project includes the design and construction of Parmely Street from U.S. 41 to Bayshore Road.

Latest Updates:

30% design plans have been reviewed by County staff and comments are being sent back to consultant.
60% plans have been received. County staff has completed their review and returned back to the design firm.
90% plans are due on October 4, 2023

Design Development Forecast Completion Date: December 13th, 2023

Kings Highway Widening

Project Description:

This project is to widen Kings Highway from Sandhill Boulevard to the DeSoto County line. This design and construction is to replace the existing roadway with a new 4 lane divided roadway with protected turn lanes. The design also includes utility infrastructure, street lighting and pedestrian sidewalks.

Latest Updates:

This project is currently in the beginning of the design phase. The survey contractor has started gathering all the site data to start the design layout.

30% plans have been received. County staff has completed their review and returned to the design firm.

60% plans are due on October 27, 2023.

Design Development Forecast Completion Date: April 18th, 2024

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to approve the Consent Agenda. *Commissioner Herston* seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

10. MPO Director's Annual Evaluation

Pursuant to the terms of Paragraph 1, of the First Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement for Administrative Services between Charlotte County and the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO, the MPO Director shall be subject to an annual performance evaluation conducted by the MPO governing board. Janette Knowlton discussed documents regarding the MPO Director's second annual performance evaluation with the MPO Board Members.

Mr. Harris received high praise from the MPO Board Members regarding his performance. MPO Chair Constance noted that it was very helpful for Mr. Harris to attend local community public meetings and characterized him as available, helpful and knowledgeable.

Commissioner Tiseo made a Motion to approve the pay for performance increase (4%) set forth by the MPO Board for the MPO Director and make it retroactive to the date the County implemented its increase. **Commissioner Herston** seconded the motion, and it carried unanimously.

11. FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (FDOT) REPORT

Pam Barr stated that the FDOT Tentative Work Program was now available. FDOT's online Public Hearing would take place October 16-October 20th with the in-person meeting on Wednesday, October 18th, from 10:00am-12 Noon at both the SWAO Office (Fort Myers) and FDOT District One Headquarters (Bartow).

Pam Barr provided updates on various projects:

FDOT Led Discussion

A. <u>US 41 at Olean Boulevard</u> (Pam Barr/Wayne Gaither-FDOT/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

Stephen Davis from FDOT District One Traffic Operations provided an update on "right turn on red" restrictions at the intersections of US 41 with both Olean Blvd and Harbor View Blvd. FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (FDOT) REPORT

Mayor Matthews received confirmation from Mr. Davis that right turns on red would be allowed from both lanes of westbound Harbor View Rd. Since this was the case, Commissioner Constance asked if the stop bars would be moved. Stephen Davis confirmed that this would be the case in a staggered fashion. At Olean Blvd, a right turn would only be allowed from the right lane due to the pedestrian crosswalk safety issue. Commissioner Tiseo thanked FDOT for moving forward with these needed changes.

B. <u>SR 776 at Flamingo Boulevard</u> - (Pam Barr/Wayne Gaither -FDOT/ Robert Fakhri - Charlotte County)

Construction of the intersection signal project is programmed by FDOT for FY 2025 for \$1.4 million. Commissioner Constance noted that the County was seeking additional funding sources for the project and appreciated the current collaboration with FDOT.

C. <u>SR 776 at the Charlotte Sports Park</u> – Intersection Improvements (Pam Barr/Wayne Gaither -FDOT/ Robert Fakhri -Charlotte County)

FDOT has the addition of turn lanes at the Charlotte Sports Park and the Charlotte County Fairgrounds programmed with \$150,000 for design in FY 2025 and \$601,000 for construction in FY 2027.

Commissioner Tiseo asked John Elias to comment on plans for the SR 776 turn lanes into the Sports Park during events. Mr. Elias stated that during the design phase, staff would be trying to develop as much vehicle stacking as possible. The double west bound SR 776 left turn lanes into the Sports Park would only be utilized with the signal or in the presence of emergency personnel during events. Otherwise, the extra lane would be striped and not utilized. Mr. Elias verified that adequate right turn lanes into both the Sports Park and the Fairgrounds would be reviewed during the design phase to allow for stacking ability to keep traffic from backing up onto SR 776. As with the earlier request for the Sunseeker intersections on US 41, Chair Constance requested that the County staff also provide a rough sketch of the planned Sports Park/Fairgrounds intersection.

D. <u>I-75 Possible New Interchange North of Kings Hwy Interchange</u> - (Pam Barr/Wayne Gaither-FDOT)

Although the North and South portions of the I-75 Master Plan are completed, the Central segment is complex and still under development with no completion timeline. Secretary Nandam stated that the I-75 Master Plan is intended to define what the future will look like. The need for a possible new interchange North of Kings Highway would be contained in the Master Plan's Central section and would consider two locations. He noted a need for consensus of all MPO Boards and other local entities. The Interchange Justification Report (IJR) would be needed, but first an analysis of the local roadway network was necessary in order to identify it. The first step was to show the need for the interchange. Commissioner Constance asked if discussion should occur now to consider additional local roadways to connect and regionalize the interchange area. Secretary Nandam stated that staff from Sarasota and DeSoto Counties had already had network discussions with Charlotte County staff.

Joint Local and FDOT Discussion

A. <u>Harbor View Road Combined Funding Strategies</u> - (Wayne Gaither-FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

John Elias stated that during the prior week, Public Works staff met with FDOT and County Administration staff to discuss funding for this project. He observed that many moving parts were involved. There was still a funding shortfall for Phase 1 Right-of-Way (ROW), since it is very costly. A Local Area Program (LAP) agreement would be brought to the Board of County Commissioners (BCC). Additionally, PD&E is undergoing revision and will require an additional public hearing previously slated for January 18, 2024 but moved up to December 5, 2023. This would allow for more time for the acquisition of ROW that would be required for the LAP agreement.

Commissioner Tiseo asked Secretary Nandam to provide project funding insight. Secretary Nandam commented that cost increases were occurring statewide whether for ROW as with local funding or other components such as FDOT construction funding. Secretary Nandam stated that he needed to have a discussion with County Administration staff to determine how much the County might contribute. Given that the roadway was a Charlotte County facility, additional federal funding must be obtained by the locals for ROW. FDOT had a solution for the construction phase (a \$6 million increase). Commissioner Constance noted that there had been discussions regarding this project for almost a decade, and locals just wanted an answer. He noted that local commercial property owners had lost out on financing due to delays regarding decisions on their frontage. He wondered how this slow pace was justifiable. The costs were on the backs of local government, but the delays were not caused by the County. He stated that ROW can't be purchased without design completion, and the pace was too slow. He emphasized that a design is needed from the engineers now. He asked if this effort could be prioritized. Secretary Nandam acknowledged that there were some previous communication gaps, especially regarding conservation easement efforts. FDOT's schedule was being compressed for the public hearing and the design completion. FDOT has done everything they can, but the need for another public hearing and FHWA approval must occur. John Elias noted that there have been delays, and it is the federal requirements that drive the timelines. Although he understood the public's impatience, another public hearing would be necessary. Commissioner Tiseo stressed that collaboration is important since the County cannot afford all the costs. He was happy that the County was partnering with FDOT. He agreed that there had been lots of difficulties, many of which were unforeseen. Secretary Nandam praised MPO Board Member comments and the great ongoing partnership. He concurred that completion that is quicker is cheaper, as currently evidenced statewide.

B. <u>US 41 (SR 45) from Kings Hwy to Peace River Bridge</u> - Comprehensive Planning/Operational Improvements Study to include but not limited to access management, multi-modal, bicycle and pedestrian connectivity improvements (Wayne Gaither-FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

The \$150,000 previously programmed for design was deferred out of FY 2025 to FY 2029 Draft Tentative Work program. The impending opening of the Sunseeker Resort and implementation of a new traffic signal will undoubtedly impact the traffic patterns along this US 41 corridor segment from the base of the bridge to Kings Highway. The purpose of the study is to provide a comprehensive analysis of traffic operations along this corridor and determine data-backed recommendations to improve safety and traffic operational efficiencies as appropriate. Secretary Nandam indicated that the funding was deferred for Work Program balancing purposes. He also indicated that this deferral was an oversight. Given the critical need for this in-depth study at this location, FDOT District 1 will be restoring the \$150,000 programmed for this study in Fiscal Year (FY) 2025.

C. <u>Bermont Road (CR 74) Safety Discussion</u> – (FDOT/John Elias/Robert Fakhri-Charlotte County)

John Elias noted that some temporary solutions had been completed, and the County was still looking for funding for other intermediate and long-term solutions. Commissioner Tiseo stated that these improvements were well received by residents, and the striping has been impactful.

Commissioner Constance asked about the resurfacing of US 17, stating that he was glad to see the project listed. He wanted verification that it would cover the segment from US 41 to I-75. Laks Gurram confirmed that the entire project was in the current year of the FDOT Work Program, and the contract should be in place prior to June 30, 2024.

Mayor Matthews thanked FDOT very much for the recent emergency road repair on Olympia Avenue near the historic Old Courthouse area of downtown Punta Gorda. She applauded FDOT for doing a great job getting the roadway online quickly.

Laks Gurram commented further regarding the US 17 project. He noted that FDOT is considering extending the roadway at the I-75 exit ramp onto US 17 northbound to construct a through-lane all the way to Piper Road. This would eliminate the current traffic bottleneck, The goal is to complete this work along with the US 17 repaving. Commissioner Herston asked how FDOT repaving addresses aligning the base with manhole leaks. Secretary Nandam responded that as part of scoping, if there is a failure around manholes, it is addressed. Mayor Matthews verified that the bricking motif will not go away.

12. FY 2023/2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)/MPO Agreement Amendment

D'Juan Harris discussed this necessary procedural amendment to the UPWP document, which is the MPO's two-year budget document.

This amendment added \$168,258 from FY 2021/2022 funding that was not expended by the end of FY 2022. These closeout funds are being added to tasks in the current FY2023/2024 UPWP (see summary of task additions below). These revisions will also require an amendment to the MPO's agreement to harmonize all corresponding funding changes. This amendment was reviewed by the TAC and CAC.

The revisions/amendments include:

- Adding \$36,112 in Task 1 Administration in salaries and benefits account line from FY 2021/2022 closeout
- Adding \$20,519 in Task 2 Data Collection, Analysis & Mapping salaries/benefits account line from FY 2021/2022 closeout
- Adding \$111,627 in Task 4 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) consultant account line from FY 2021/2022 closeout
- Moving \$39,048.14 from FY 2023 Task 2 Data Collection, Analysis & Mapping consultant account line adding \$20,000 in salaries and benefits and \$19,048.14 in consultant line for FY 2024 Task 2 - Data Collection, Analysis & Mapping.

Moving \$1,000 from FY 2024 Task 1 - Administration Building Lease -Rent/Storage account line and add \$500 into Subscriptions and \$500 into Repair and Maintenance (R/M) for MPO Equipment & Vehicle.

Commissioner Tiseo made a motion to approve the proposed amendments to the FY 2024 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) to include the following updates: (1) Adding \$36,112 in Task 1 – Administration in salaries and benefits account line from FY 2021/2022 closeout, (2) Adding \$20,519 in Task 2 – Data Collection, Analysis & Mapping salaries/benefits account line from FY 2021/2022 closeout, (3) Adding \$111,627 in Task 4 – Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) consultant account line from FY 2021/2022 closeout, (4) Moving \$39,048.14 from FY 2023 Task 2- Data Collection, Analysis & Mapping consultant account line adding \$20,000 in salaries and benefits and \$19,048.14 in consultant line for FY 2024 Task 2- Data Collection, Analysis & Mapping, and (5) Moving \$1,000 from FY 2024 Task 1 - Administration Building Lease-Rent/Storage account line and add \$500 into Subscriptions and \$500 into R/M Equipment/Vehicle. This motion allows for transmittal of the amendments to the MPO Agreement and FDOT Cost Analysis Certification form. These revisions will allow staff to make minor non-financial changes and adjustments based upon input received from FDOT. **Mayor Matthews** seconded the motion. It carried unanimously.

13. <u>Urban Area Boundary / Functional Classification Review</u>

Federal Functional Classification is a legislative requirement of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The Functional Classification is updated every 10 years to establish a list which of candidate roads in the overall hierarchy of roadways.

The classification is used for planning, budgeting, programming, fiscal management and to evaluate Federal, State and Local highway programs. MPOs and FDOT use the process to develop the Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) and Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

The first step in the process is to determine the urban area boundary. The second step is the classification of roadways. There are five functional classification categories that are common to rural and urban roads: Principal Arterial, Minor Arterial, Major Collector, Minor Collector and Local.

Kyle Purvis gave a PowerPoint presentation to the MPO Board Members on the Urban Area Boundary/Functional Classification Review.

Mayor Matthews noted that the City of Punta Gorda would be working later in the week to update the City's Comprehensive Plan for submittal by November 1, 2023. She requested FDOT and MPO staff assistance in ensuring consistency between the City's Comprehensive Plan amendment and FDOT's transportation planning documents, as related to lane diets on Marion Avenue. She asked staff to coordinate this effort with Punta Gorda City Manager Greg Murray and other City staff. (*Post meeting City staff provided this information: the Transportation Element. Lane diets on Marion are mentioned in Map #60 (page 32), Table 7.14 (page 37), and Policy 7.1.7.3 (page 44).)*

Commissioner Tiseo inquired regarding realignment of classifications and the impact of funding changes. Kyle Purvis stated that under the State Transportation Block Grant Program, nothing would be lost unless an arterial or collector changed to a local road (often due to a change to a cul-de-sac). Secretary Nandam noted that the amount of County allocation does not change, and FHWA emergency funding must be for roadways in the federal network.

Commissioner Herston asked about the consultant recommendation to elevate Harbor View Road status as it might limit driveways at that location. Robert Fakhri agreed to double check with the consultant, since the County relies on FDOT access management on this County road.

14. Apportionment Plan Update

Federal laws and regulations require metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) to be designated for each urban area with a population greater than 50,000 people [23 CFR 450.310(a), 23 USC 134(d)]. This designation is accomplished by agreement between the Governor and the affected units of local government. The federal rules allow the states and units of local government to largely determine the specific composition of the MPOs. In Florida, Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, provides the requirements for MPO membership composition and apportionment of the voting membership.

After each decennial census, MPOs must review the composition of their membership and submit an Apportionment Plan to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and Florida Governor's Office that meets state and federal requirements. On May 16, 2023, the FDOT announced the start of the MPO Apportionment Process and have given MPOs 180 days to submit their apportionment plans to FDOT.

D'Juan Harris stated that there are no major changes anticipated to the Urbanized Area Population Maps during this census cycle, and this update will fall in the "Minor/No Change Category." There is a sliver of urbanized area population from Sarasota/Manatee MPO that is now encroaching into Lee County MPO's urbanized area in Boca Grande. Per coordination with the neighboring MPO Directors, this new urbanized area population will be addressed with additional verbiage in the Interlocal agreement between the Sarasota/Manatee MPO and the Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO. A draft of the revised interlocal agreement will be made available at the Joint Sarasota/Manatee and Charlotte County-Punta Gorda MPO Board Meeting on January 29, 2023. The update to the Apportionment Plan is due to FDOT by the end of November 2023. **Commissioner Tiseo** made a motion to approve the "Minor / No Change" Update to the Charlotte County – Punta Gorda's MPO Apportionment Plan. **Commissioner Herston** seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

15. <u>Revised Work Assignment Order / Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Scope Review</u>

D'Juan Harris stated that the previously approved Consultant Work Assignment Order was revised during negotiations to reduce the amount of the shall not exceed amount of consultant services to \$262,000 and include the Consulting firm's full legal name. A marked up revised copy was included in the packet for reference. <u>Safe Streets and Roads for All Revised Work</u> Assignment Order / Comprehensive Safety Action Plan Draft Scope of Services

D'Juan Harris introduced Katie Shannon, Vanasse Hangen Brustlin, Inc (VHB) who provided a brief overview of the Safe Streets and Roads for All Scope of Services for MPO Board comments and consideration of approval. <u>Scope Presentation & Draft Schedule</u>

The action plan will be based on the United States Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration's Safe System approach. The action plan will identify the High Injury Network based upon existing crash data and provide recommendations to implement countermeasures to reduce the prevalence of serious injuries and fatalities along these high crash corridors within Charlotte County. Recommendations may also be made based on input gained from the community in several public engagement sessions and from an established Task Force comprised of representative stakeholders from the community.

Commissioner Tiseo praised the cost savings recently negotiated by MPO staff.

Commissioner Tiseo made a motion to approve the revisions to the Work Assignment Order and the scope of services for the development of the Safe Streets and Roads for All Comprehensive Safety Action Plan. **Commissioner Herston** seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

16. Public Comments

There were no public comments.

17. Staff Comments

D'Juan Harris had provided MPO Board Members an MPO Director's Staff Report in their meeting packets. He reported on the following non-agenda items:

MPO Transition to .gov Website and E-mail Status Update

MPO Staff initiated the process to fully transition all Website and E-Mail addresses to a .gov domain address on **July 25, 2023**, with a meeting with Charlotte County IT staff to discuss necessary steps.

1st Step – MPO Staff submitted an authorization letter on **August 1, 2023** and applied for domain address of "CCPGMPO.gov" with the <u>Registrar@dotgov.gov</u> Final discretion of naming convention is left to CISA's discretion. 2nd Step – Commissioner Constance as the authorizing authority validated our Organizational Structure and governmental entity status with .gov registrar on **August 9, 2023** 3rd Step - Authorization Letter and domain address request forwarded to Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) for final review and approval. Customer support

indicated CISA approval could take one to two months. Request was approved on **October 4**, **2023**.Next Step –MPO Staff will initiate transition to different domain provider (Go Daddy), and port over all website files to new CCPGMPO.gov domain address.

MPOAC SunTrax Tour

This tour will be conducted in conjunction with the MPOAC Meeting on October 26, 2023, in Auburndale, Florida. MPO and City Staff will be participating.

Harbor View Road Public Hearing

D'Juan Harris noted that the Harbor View Road Public Workshop has been accelerated to December 5, 2023. Details on location and time will follow.

18. Member Comments

Commissioner Tiseo welcomed Secretary Nandam back from his temporary work assignment in Tallahassee. He praised Mr. Nandam for his reassuring delivery style whether it involved good or bad news.

Commissioner Deutsch raised the issue of signification at the intersections of Forrest Nelson Blvd/US 41 and Flamingo Blvd/SR 776. He also commented that County signals are now working post-hurricane, but they require motorists to endure lengthy full cycle waiting due to timing issues (example: intersection of Harbor Blvd and US 41).

19. Adjournment

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:24 p.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting of the MPO Board will be held on Monday, December 18, 2023 at 2:00 p.m. at the Charlotte County Administration Center, 18500 Murdock Circle, Room #119, Port Charlotte, Florida, 33948.

Discussion:

The MPO Advisory Council (MPOAC) launched a Pilot Passenger Rail Priorities Program (PRPP). The goal of this program is to expand rail options across the State of Florida while creating a comprehensive, integrated, and coordinated multi-modal network. Potential rail projects in Florida identified through this program will be disseminated to FDOT for potential leveraging of funds available under the Florida Rail Enterprise, and federal discretionary rail grants available under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL).

Staff from the four Southwest Florida MPOs including Collier, Lee, Charlotte, and Sarasota/Manatee have coordinated with each other and have agreed to submit a Joint Priority Request under this program for a Southwest Florida Rail Study.

A Rail Study would investigate the feasibility of implementing an inter-city or high-speed rail service on I-75 utilizing the median multi-modal transit envelope (median) and connecting all four metropolitan areas with existing and planned passenger rail network at Tampa.

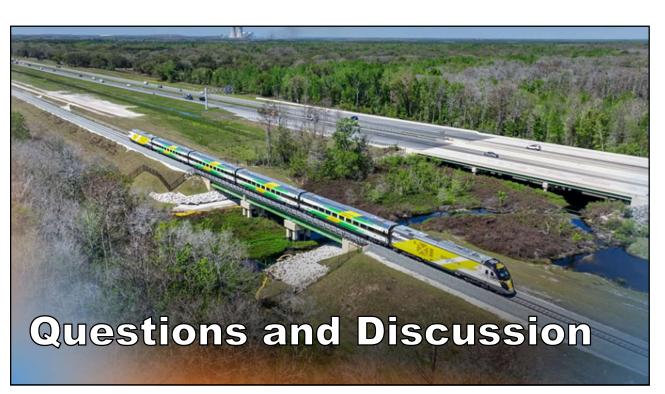

Joint resolution by the Metropolitan Planning Organizations of Collier, Lee, Charlotte County - Punta Gorda, and Sarasota/Manatee supporting the submission of an application to make the case for the inclusion of a Southwest Florida Rail Study among the Passenger Rail Priorities of the Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council

Whereas, there are no existing and planned intercity or high speed rail service serving the major urban centers in Southwest Florida;

Whereas, the Federal Railroad Administration's (FRA) long term regional passenger rail vision plan for the Southeast Region, developed in December 2020, identifies passenger rail service from Tampa to Naples via Bradenton, Sarasota, Port Charlotte, and Fort Myers, as shown in **Exhibit A**;

Whereas, FDOT's Rail System Plan, updated in October 2023, illustrates three tiers of Conceptual Intercity Passenger Rail Corridor Connections;

Whereas, one of those rail corridor connections serving new passenger rail markets include a Miami-Naples-Tampa passenger rail alignment under Tier III as shown in **Exhibit B**;

Whereas, FDOT will be evaluating all three tiers of corridors at some point of time to assess their ability to help achieve the statewide vision for passenger rail;

Whereas, the Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council has launched a Passenger Rail Priorities Program (PRPP) Pilot and is identifying priority intercity passenger rail projects that can enhance Florida's rail projects;

Whereas, the list of potential passenger rail priorities will allow Florida to take advantage of new funding opportunities available through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill, and planning grants available through the Florida Rail Enterprise;

Whereas, a Southwest Florida Rail Study among the list of priorities would highlight the lack of existing and planned passenger rail service in Southwest Florida, and brings urgency to fund and undertake the study; Whereas, the Southwest Florida Rail Study would investigate the feasibility of running an intercity (Amtrak) or high speed rail on I -75 using the multi-modal transit envelope and connecting all four metropolitan areas with existing and planned passenger rail network in Tampa;

Whereas, the results and recommendations from the study would help guide FDOT, the four Metropolitan Planning Organizations of Collier, Lee, Charlotte County-Punta Gorda and Sarasota/Manatee (together, the BOARDS). The study would also assist local governments to coordinate, collaborate, plan, and fund the next phases for establishing intercity or high speed passenger rail service in Southwest Florida.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY ALL FOUR (4) METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION BOARDS IN SOUTHWEST FLORIDA THAT:

- The BOARDS support the submission of an application by all four MPOs to make the case for the inclusion of a Southwest Florida Rail Study among the Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council's Passenger Rail Priorities.
- 2. That this resolution may be executed and sent in counterparts, each of which shall be deemed original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same instrument.

Annual visitors to the region have been surging as well with the region's two major highways (US 41 and I 75) connecting all five counties continuing to face challenges in roadway capacity and congestion. This upward trajectory in population and visitors will only continue into the future and there will be even more pressure on these north south roadways. In a scenario like this, having other multimodal transportation choices such as passenger rail can relieve roadway congestion, reduce crashes, and improve overall air quality. But there is no existing or proposed intercity or high speed rail service serving the major urban centers in Southwest Florida. A passenger rail study will investigate the feasibility of running both intercity (Amtrak) and high speed rail on I 75 using the multimodal transit envelope and connecting these metro areas to Tampa and its existing intercity (Amtrak) and planned high speed (Brightline extension from Orlando to Tampa) rail network. Results and recommendations from the study will help guide FDOT, the four (4) Southwest Florida MPOs, and local governments within these metropolitan areas to coordinate, collaborate, and fund the next phases for establishing intercity and/or high speed passenger rail services in Southwest Florida.

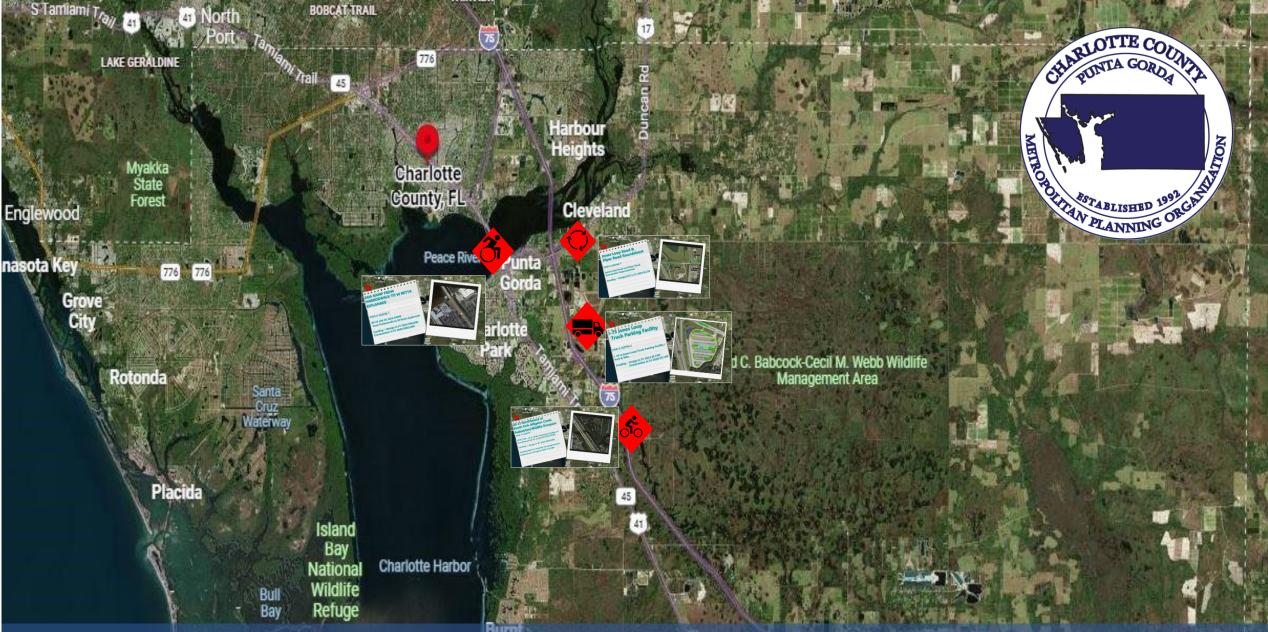

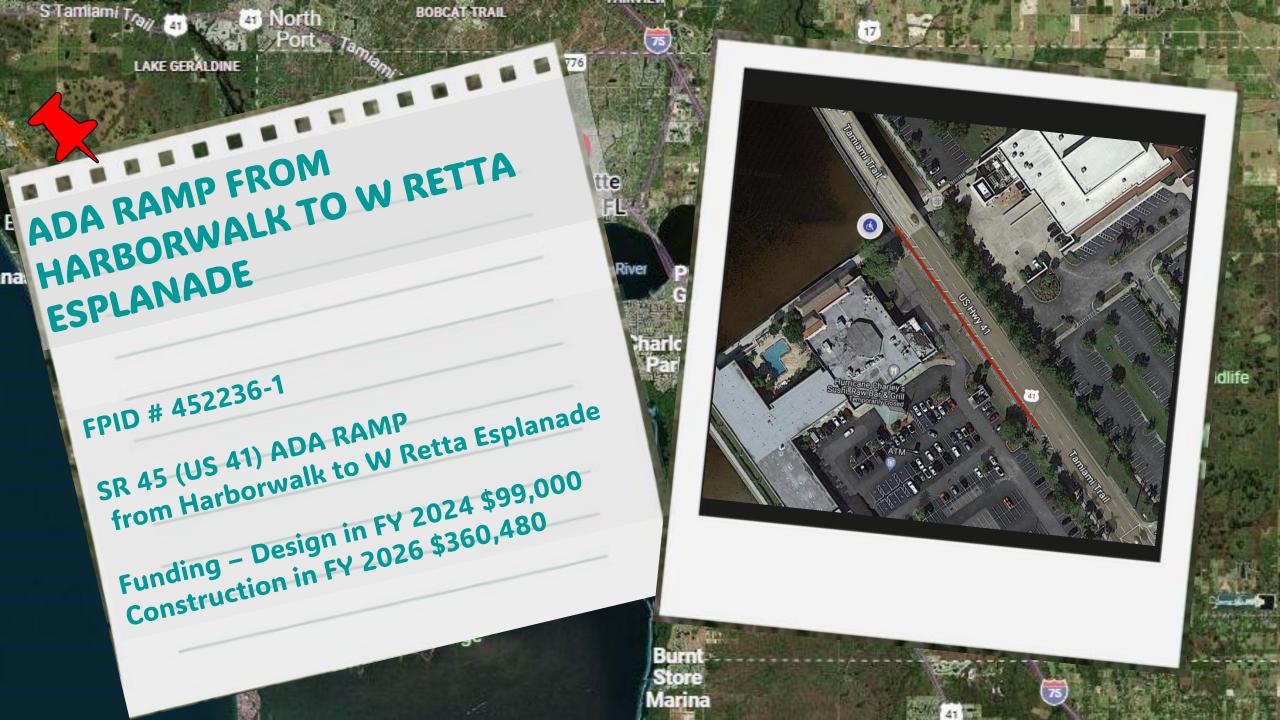

MPOs are required annually to adopt Safety Performance Measure Targets for tracking progress towards the Statewide/MPO targets for each of the transportation performance measures and meet Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) requirements.

FHWA has established five national Safety Performance Measures which all State Departments of Transportation and MPOs must address. Unlike other performance measures applicable only to the National Highway System (NHS), the Safety Performance Measures apply to all public roads. The 2024 Safety Performance Measures and target goals are listed in the table below:

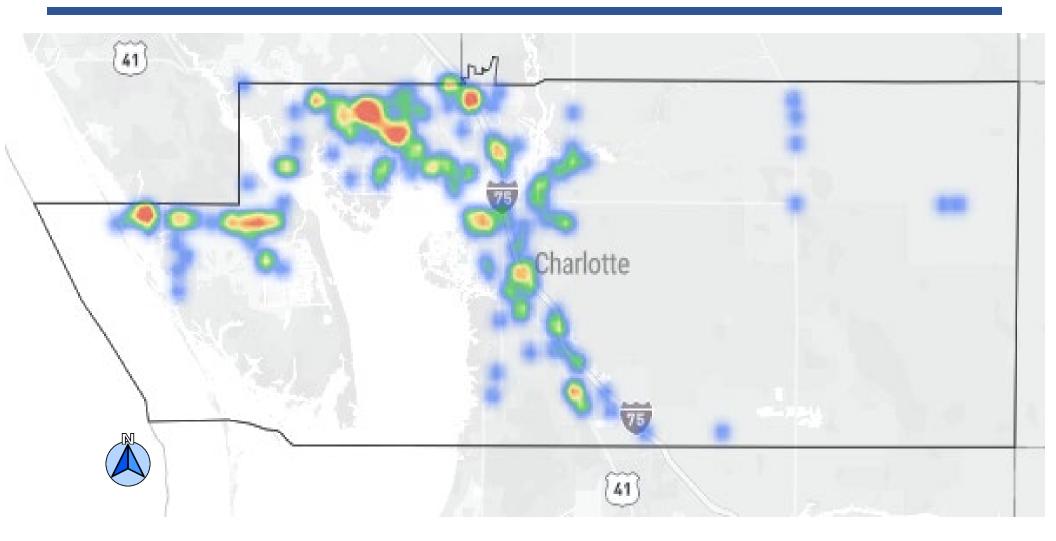

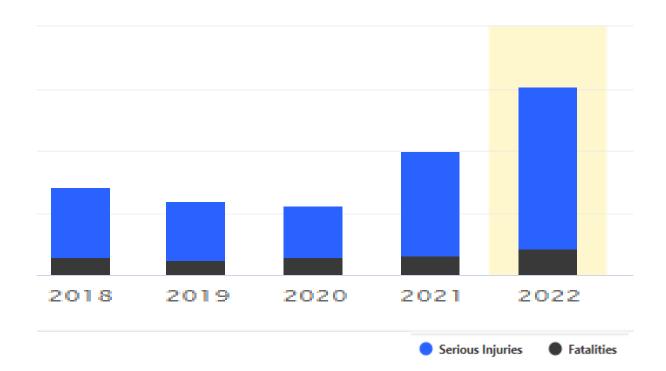


Charlotte County Heat Map of Fatalities & Serious Injuries 2022

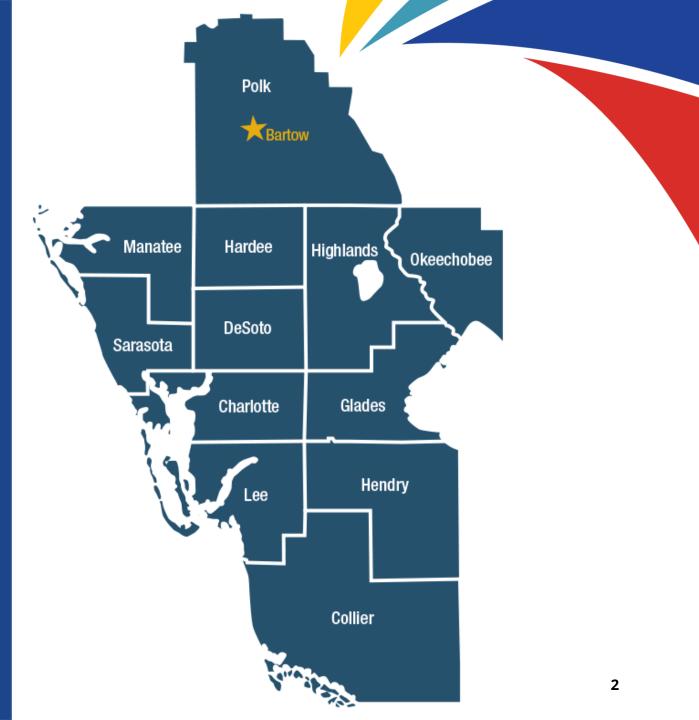

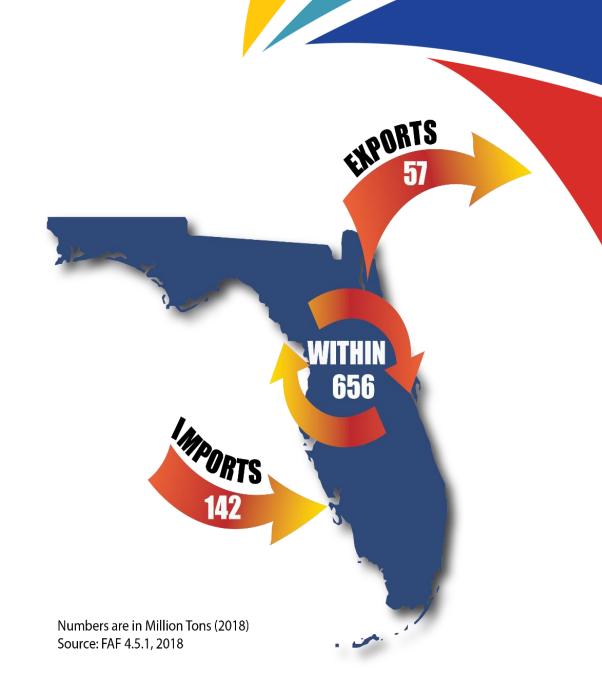

On June 28, 2023, Kimley Horn & Associates briefed the advisory committee members on the 2050 socioeconomic data development process (population and employment). The committee was informed about control totals and the phases involved in the development of the forecast.

The Consultant staff met with the MPO and local governmental staffs on September 21, 2023 and October 30, 2023 to identify Charlotte County growth at the TAZ level and to address any discrepancies in the 2050 forecast. 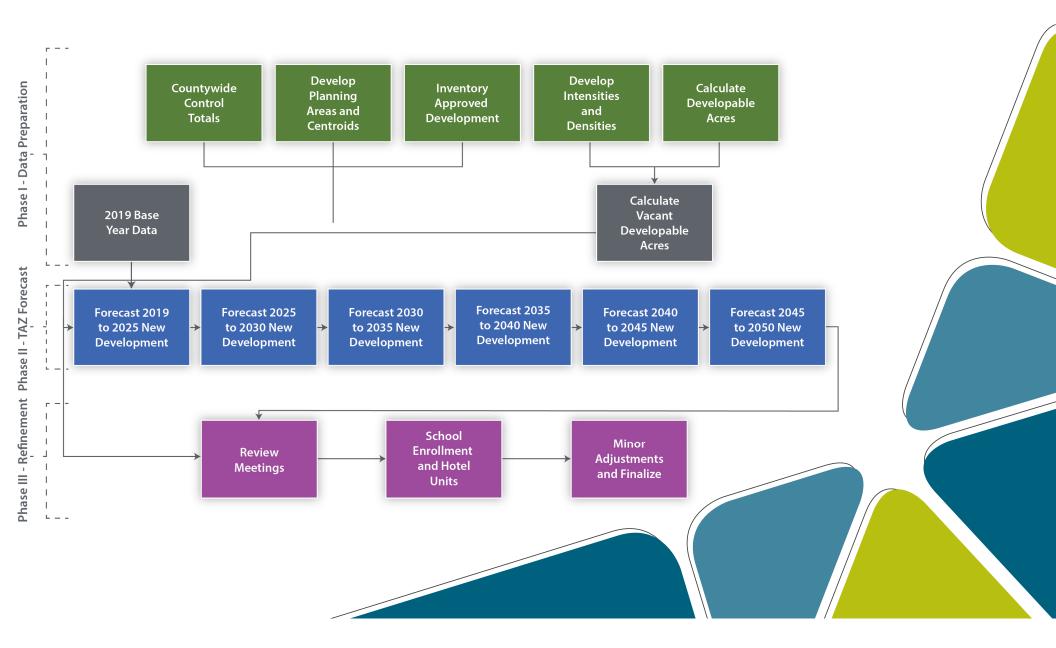

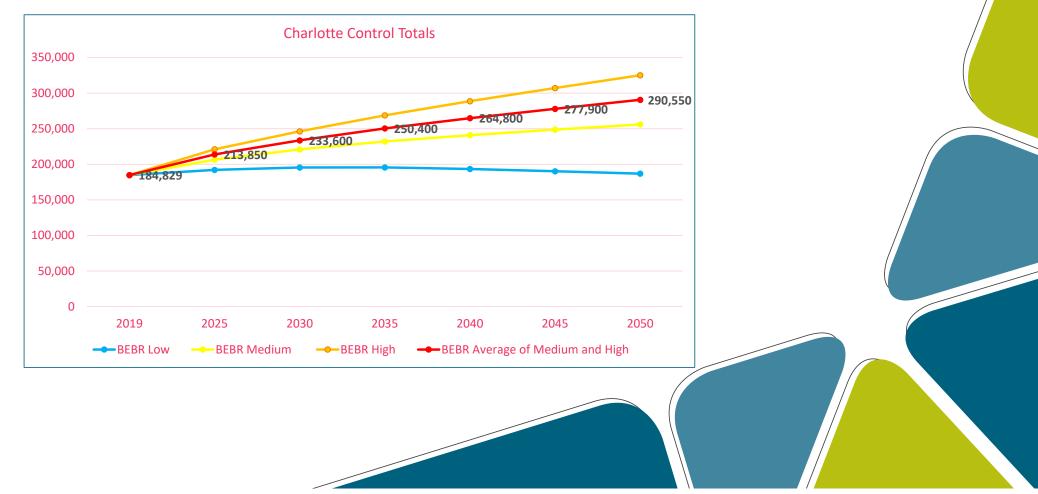

Charlotte County Population



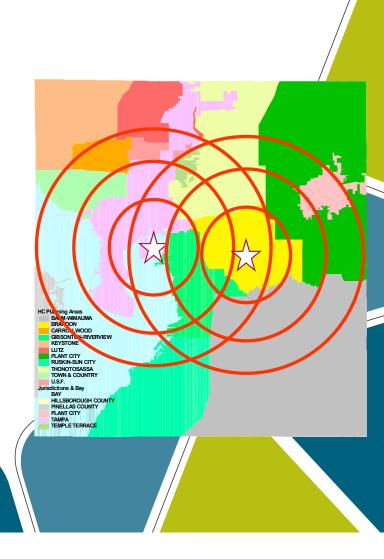

Subject: U.S. 41 and Burnt Store Road traffic

Mr. Secretary,

On November 21, 2023, at a joint meeting between Charlotte County and the City of Punta Gorda, traffic circulation near Burnt Store Road, U.S. 41, and Madrid Boulevard was discussed.

The discussion centered on the following traffic concerns:

- Drivers having difficulty turning left from the Home Depot driveway on Burnt Store Road.
- A signal meets the warrant at the Home Depot driveway; however, the proximity to the U.S. 41 signal must be considered. The City Council requests FDOT support of this request.
- Citizens' complaints about cut-through traffic on residential streets in Burnt Store Isles from the commercial development to reach the signal at Monaco Drive and U.S. 41.
- Complaints about traffic weaving from Madrid Blvd. to the signal at Burnt Store Road.
- Traffic calming measures have already been taken on Burnt Store Road, but the City Council believes that a traffic signal at the Home Depot driveway is urgently needed for public safety.
- Madrid Boulevard used to be a full median opening; however, it was changed to only a directional crossing. City Council is requesting reconsideration of FDOT to reopen the intersection at Madrid/U.S. 41, adding a traffic signal for public safety.

The Punta Gorda City Council respectfully requests the department to evaluate the installation of a traffic signal at the access of the Home Depot driveway on Burnt Store Rd., and at Madrid Boulevard/U.S. 41 intersection (which would require fully reopening the intersection).

Additionally, the intersection at Acline Road and U.S. 41 requires a traffic signal, and for immediate safety concerns, temporarily installing flashing stop signs on both sides of Acline Road at the U.S. 41 intersection. This intersection has seen numerous traffic collisions and a City Council member was involved in a serious collision last weekend here. During the widening of Burnt Store Rd., a traffic signal was installed at this location during construction but was removed after it was done. We request that it be reinstalled permanently.

On November 21, 2023, at a joint meeting between Charlotte County and the City of Punta Gorda, traffic circulation in the vicinity of Burnt Store Road, US 41 and Madrid Boulevard was discussed.

The discussion centered around the following:

- Traffic having difficulty making a left turn from the Home Depot driveway on Burnt store road.
- A signal meets the warrant at the Home Depot driveway however the close proximity to the US 41 signal is of a major concern on the operation of both signals.
- Citizens' complaints about cut-thru traffic on residential streets from the commercial development to reach the signal at Monaco Drive and US 41.
- Complaints about traffic weaving from Madrid Blvd. to the signal at Burnt • Store Road.
- Traffic calming measures have already been taken on Burnt Store Road
- Madrid Boulevard used to be a full median opening however it was changed to a directional crossing only.
- Both the County Board and the City Council strongly believe that a signal • at Madrid Boulevard coupled with a review and revision of the access of the Home Depot driveway is the best approach.

The Board respectfully requests the Department to evaluate the installation of a traffic signal at Madrid Boulevard coupled with modifications to the access of Home Depot driveway at Burnt Store Road.

Secretary Buttigieg,

As Secretary of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), it is my responsibility to keep Florida's supply chain moving to ensure it can support over 22.5 million residents, 137 million visitors, and a top-15 global economy. Today, FDOT is managing the largest Transportation Work Program in state history totaling over \$68 billion, with only 25% coming from federal sources. Given these record investments, my fiduciary responsibility to Florida taxpayers is more important than ever and extends to the evaluation of federal programs-whether formula-based or competitive.

In consultation with my team and after careful review of the requirements for the U.S. Department of Transportation's (USDOT) formula-based 'Carbon Reduction' Program outlined in 23 USC 175, I write to formally notify you of FDOT's decision to not participate in the continued efforts of this program. In making this decision, it became clear that conflicts exist between the authority granted to USDOT by Congress and the broad interpretation that USDOT seeks to implement.

As I noted last year in comments¹ regarding USDOT's attempt to legislate through administrative action, nothing within the IIJA explicitly allows for federally-induced mandates for states to track, or achieve a certain level, of reduced CO2 emissions. Further, to-date USDOT has failed to publish or provide guidance it committed to in April 2022, "on the process under which the Secretary will certify state transportation emissions reductions."²

As highlighted in Florida's recent³ response to a similar proposal by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Florida has the cleanest air on record, meeting or exceeding all EPA benchmarks, with emissions continuing to fall as fast as our state grows.

Rather than support the continued politicization of our roadways, FDOT's time, money, and resources will be focused on building roads and bridges-not reducing carbon emissions. Please consider this letter as FDOT's response to your department's November 15th deadline. My team
